



Night of Fire

Shortly after the death of Blaise Pascal in 1662, a housekeeper was sorting through closets and clothing and happened to notice something sewn into Pascal's coat. Beneath the cloth was a parchment and inside this was another faded piece of paper. In Pascal's handwriting, on both the parchment and the paper were nearly the same words. Beside hand-drawn crosses, Pascal had carefully written:

The year of grace 1654.

Monday, 23 November, feast of St. Clement...

*From about half-past ten in the evening
until about half-past midnight.*

Fire.

*The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the
God of Jacob...*

The God of Jesus Christ...

Your God will be my God.

More than 30 descriptive lines tell the story (unbeknownst to friends and family) of Pascal's conversion to Christ. He is said to have been reading of the crucifixion when he was suddenly overwhelmed with the nearness of Christ. Pascal then meticulously transcribed the night of his conversion, his "night of fire," sewing it into his jacket where it would remain beside him until his death eight years later. Though the details of the story and the parchment were unknown to those around him, the change in his life could have scarcely gone unnoticed. Whatever else it marked, November 23, 1654 marked new

life for Pascal. He reoriented all his activities (including his unparalleled work in the field of mathematics) to further serve a life of worship and service to God. He retired to the monastery at Port Royal and set to writing his *Pensees*, a collection of thoughts on life and theology.

There are many who house similar awakenings to faith before the person of Christ, if not kept in coat linings, then perhaps tucked protectively somewhere else. Whether, like Pascal, there is a specific night of fire that can be cited, conversion is not always easy to put into words. How does one explain what it is like to come out of a deep sleep, to rise from a night of fire, or to find oneself somehow newly born? The blind man could not articulate every detail of his encounter with Christ, but neither could he deny the startling evidence of his presence: "One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see," he said in John 9:25. Nicodemus, too, had trouble getting his mind around the language and the metaphor of new life. "How can a man be born when he is old?" His question voices a reluctance common of all newborns, even as it harbors a resistance reflective of the sort of change Jesus implies with his invitation.

Whatever else Nicodemus and Pascal have in common in their nighttime encounters with Christ, one thing is certain. Whether a dramatic encounter or a subtle introduction, Christ has in mind more than an evening or an instance. A beloved professor of mine spoke of Christian conversion as a verb that arrives in several tenses. *We have been justified, we are being sanctified, and we will be glorified.* That is to say, on the Cross, Christ became our sacrifice, and the work is finished for all. God has declared his children righteous because we are united to

his Son. But Christ is also our moral influence, the message of the gospel is transformational, and the believer is continually being sanctified through the Holy Spirit. To the one who has been united with the Son, the daily indwelling of Christ is a gift and a sign of the message that is presently being worked within us. Furthermore, what a person will be in Christ through the process of sanctification and the promise of justification has not yet been fully revealed, but there are signs all around of the hope and glory that is to come in Christ Jesus.

The Incarnation boldly assures us that Christ is always near. The Cross assures that he can come nearer still and forgive you completely and instantaneously. He will also walk with you over a lifetime, transforming and shaping you according to the will of God. Whether by fire, water, or Spirit, in an instance of spiritual certainty or a lifetime of wordless mystery, Christ comes near not to beckon better children but to make his creations new.

Jesus: Example or Sacrifice?

Some believe Jesus came to show us how to live a good life—and to be sure, He is our example of righteousness. We are to become like Him. But that isn't the reason Jesus came. He came to earth so He could die a sacrificial, substitutionary, all-sufficient atoning death for your sins.

Paul writes, "He made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us" (2 Cor. 5:21). God foretold the Messiah's coming and foreshadowed it in blood sacrifices throughout Scripture. The sinless Lord Jesus shed His blood to ransom sinners back to a holy God. He was the perfect Substitute who allowed for our redemption.

The meaning of the word redemption is two Hebrew roots that designate a process by which something alienated may be recovered for its original owner by paying a sum of money. This alluded more to slaves being redeemed by money, and we have already seen in 1 Peter 1:18 how "gold and silver" could not redeem us.

Instead, Christ died for our sins and God accepted the payment. When Jesus cried on the cross, "It is finished," He used the word that means "paid in full." It is the same word that was stamped across bills when they were paid. The debt was canceled. The ransom was paid.

If Jesus had not come, there would be no crucifixion, no resurrection, and no redemption. The New Testament consistently confronts us with this message: Christ died for us. Jesus came so that you and I might have eternal life through the forgiveness He provides. But we must come to Him and confess our transgressions. When we do, He saves us and removes the burden of our guilt and shame.

Accepting Him as your Savior is an act of faith and not of works. There is nothing you can do to earn salvation. It is a free gift He gives to those who come to Him seeking His mercy.

If you are looking for forgiveness on the basis of your pleas, promises, and performance, then you will remain in your sins. Only if you accept His sacrifice will you open yourself to receiving the fullness of God's life-giving Spirit.

Take time right now to tell the Father that you need Him and that you want to be set free from every sin preventing you from experiencing His very best. When you do, your life will change. The burden of your heart will lift, and you will be free to experience the fullness of God's unconditional love.

Bearing the Burden of Proof

I recently attended a debate titled "Does God exist?" on the campus of LSU between a Christian and an atheist. The Christian offered four well thought out arguments regarding God as Creator, the Intelligent Designer, the basis for moral standards and the miracle of the resurrection. The atheist dismissed these arguments out of hand, by claiming they were based only on ordinary evidence. He quoted Carl Sagan, a famous atheist astronomer, who said, "Extraordinary claims require extraordinary evidence," an expression now known as "Sagan's saw." With Easter approaching, perhaps now would be a good time to address this issue of the burden of proof. What type of evidence should be required to support the belief that Jesus rose from the dead? Nothing is more important. The apostle Paul in I Corinthians 15:17 says, "...and if Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless..."

The New Orleans Saints won Super Bowl XLIV in 2010. To many, that was extraordinary! It happened, however. And why not believe it, even if you weren't there. The victory was televised, personally witnessed by thousands and confirmed by reports and testimony from those on the sidelines and players themselves. These sources were believable as they reported the Super Bowl results honestly just as they had countless other games. Maybe you believed the Saints couldn't possibly win a Super Bowl because they never had before or thought they just weren't good enough. If even now you don't believe they won, because you need some kind of "extraordinary evidence," you're just being like the atheist at LSU, too closed minded to believe. Ordinary sources like those used in reporting Super Bowl XLIV are used every day by scholars and most people to accept as historical facts the events reported from the past if the sources are credible and the authors have truthful intent.

Mike Licona, PhD, in his book, *The Resurrection of Jesus*, discusses the sources and available information from Jesus' day which form a historical bedrock and establish Jesus as a real person with a group of followers. These sources establish his death by crucifixion, and burial in a tomb in Jerusalem that was found empty some days later. These authors also clearly document that friends and enemies of Jesus, including Saul of Tarsus, were so convinced of his post-resurrection appearances that they willingly died for their convictions. Such "ordinary evidences" include the four gospels in the Canon (the Bible), the letters of Paul and other biblical texts acknowledged by most biblical critics to be authentic writings. Outside of biblical sources are early writings of Josephus, Tacitus, Pliny the Younger, Suetonius and a number of others. The writings of Clement of Rome and Polycarp who were two apostolic fathers that actually knew or studied directly under the apostles Peter and John are reliable sources.

Space does not permit an exhaustive review of all the other first century sources corroborating the historical accuracy of the biblical accounts. These sources are all credible and authored with truthful intent. Considered together they lead to the conclusion that Jesus was raised from the dead. The first century church was founded on this bedrock amidst intense persecution. It was certainly believable then and is believable now to anyone willing to follow with an open mind the evidence which leads to a risen Lord. If this approach to credibility wasn't applied to other historical events, no facts about the ancient world could be known. All history departments at all universities would need to be closed. So

why does it seem that just information about Jesus is discredited as insufficient?

What would "extraordinary evidence" look like? Would it be some sort of personalized vision or flashing neon billboard in the sky? Perhaps a daily text message or video from heaven directly from God would suffice. It seems to me, like Dr. Licona points out, that no amount of evidence can convince some people because they hold a world view that rules out God and the resurrection ahead of time. Their "horizon" simply won't allow it. What prohibits non-believers is not the quality or weight of the evidence but their own world view which impairs their ability to see, like a thick pair of sunglasses so darkened that no amount of light can get through. The light doesn't need to shine brighter. They don't need "extraordinary evidences." They do need our help to remove their dark glasses to show them that it is their preconceived ideas which block their view. An excessive burden of proof is not placed on the evidence or on us. There is more than sufficient evidence that Jesus rose from the dead. We don't have to shoulder the burden of their darkened world view. Jesus shouldered this burden on His way to Calvary.

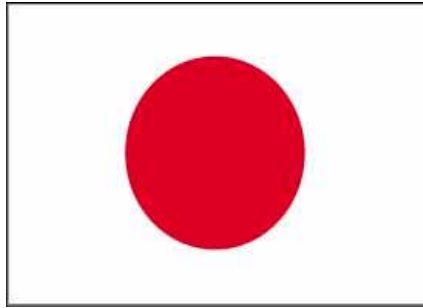

An Opportunity to Convey the Vision of Christ's Love

A longtime missionary in Japan describes that country as "rich, but poor" -- rich economically, but poor spiritually -- and now deeply in need of prayer and aid.

The massive quake and the resulting 23-foot-high tsunami that occurred on March 11 are thought to be among the worst disasters in Japan's history. Government officials report over 1,000 people have been killed, with thousands still missing. Christian organizations in Japan are quickly mobilizing to provide badly needed relief to those in need.



Dan Iverson is a church planting pastor and mission team leader in the Tokyo/Chiba area. He and his wife Carol have served in Japan since 1986 with Mission to the World, a ministry of the Presbyterian Church in America. Iverson says about 70 percent of Japanese profess no religious affiliation.

"Japan is so poor spiritually," he laments. "There's suicides every day, there's so many problems in this rich country that has no clue about the gospel -- and we just pray that God will have mercy on Japan in [the wake of] this terrible earthquake."

Only one percent of the Asian nation professes the Christian faith, but through social networking sites like Facebook and Twitter they have pulled together to establish relief centers in the hardest hit areas of Japan. That country, says Iverson, is the wealthiest unreached nation in the world.

Christian Relief, Assistance, Support and Hope (CRASH), a network supporting Christians helping with relief work in Japan, is coordinating relief efforts with Christian missionaries there. They are currently setting up a command center in Tokyo and bases in affected areas. In addition, the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability has created a link on its homepage for givers to connect with member organizations already assisting or poised to assist in the massive relief efforts there.

"Pray for the church in Japan -- the little, tiny church in Japan -- that we know how to witness in this difficult time and can use our resources," he requests. "Lots of churches in America [want to help]. Our mission wants to send teams -- and of course I said, come. It can only help to give peo-

New U.N. Resolution Steers Away from 'Defamation of Religions' Concept

The U.N. Human Rights Council has adopted a resolution on religious intolerance that freedom watchdogs say marks a significant step away from the highly criticized "defamation of religions" concept.

On Thursday, the inter-governmental body adopted the "Resolution on Combating Intolerance and Violence against Persons Based on Religion or Belief," calling upon U.N. states to adopt measures and policies to promote the full respect and protection for places of worship and religious sites, and to take measures in cases where they are vulnerable to vandalism or destruction.

The 47-member state body also called for strengthened international efforts to foster a global dialogue for the promotion of a culture of tolerance and peace at all levels, based on respect for human rights and diversity of religions and beliefs.

It did not, however, speak out against the "defamation of religions," which the Organization of the Islamic Conference has been lobbying the United Nations to make a human rights violation since 1999.

"The resolution properly focuses on protecting individuals from discrimination or violence, instead of protecting religions from criticism," noted the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom in welcoming Thursday's resolution.

"Unlike the defamation of religions resolution, the new consensus resolution does not call for legal restrictions on peaceful expression, but rather, for positive measures, such as education and awareness-building, to address intolerance, discrimination, and violence based on religion or belief," the bipartisan federal body added.

Defunding Planned Parenthood is a Christian ethics issue, not a party issue. The next congressional Continuing Resolution vote comes up on or before April 8.

Does Planned Parenthood Need or Deserve Federal Funds?

An Analysis of Planned Parenthood's Revenue and Services. A Report from the Chiaroscuro Foundation - a 501c3 non-profit grantmaking foundation located in New York City.

I. Planned Parenthood is extraordinarily wealthy in its own right, and does not need tax dollars to continue to operate.

According to its most currently published annual report, Planned Parenthood has nearly one billion dollars of net assets (\$1,197,300,000.00 assets, and \$202,600,000.00 liabilities). Planned Parenthood's most current Annual Report discloses a total of 997 million dollars in revenue to its affiliates (broken down into 404 million dollars in health center income, 363 million in government grants and contracts, 209 million dollars in private contributions, and 20 million additional dollars from other operating revenue). This means that excluding government grants and contracts Planned Parenthood affiliates brought in 634 million dollars in revenue in their fiscal year 2008-2009. This does not include 117 million dollars in revenue to the national office.

II. Planned Parenthood is an abortion organization. It provides more abortions than any other organization in the United States, about one of every four U.S. abortions.

A. More government funding of Planned Parenthood has corresponded with increased numbers of abortions there. Planned Parenthood received 363.2 million dollars of government grants and contracts in Fiscal Year 2008-09 and performed 332,278 abortions in the year ending June, 2009, or 27% of all abortions in the U.S. Planned Parenthood received 187 million dollars of government funds, and performed approximately 183,000 abortions.

B. Planned Parenthood's pregnancy services are extremely skewed toward abortion. For every adoption referral Planned Parenthood makes, it performs 340 abortions. The number of pregnancy services other than abortion have been declining recently.

C. Planned Parenthood touts its "preventive services" but they all seem to have failed to prevent the problems they claim to solve. Rates of non-marital births and sexually transmitted diseases are increasing, and rates of abortion remain very high or are increasing.

III. Planned Parenthood is not a significant primary care provider for women

In recent reports, Planned Parenthood acknowledges that it provided primary care only to about 19,700 of its 3 million unduplicated clients. These services have been trending downward for years, from 21,247 in 2007 to 20,235 in 2008, to today's 19,796.

IV. Poor women and women generally, have options for seeking pri-

mary care, contraception, STI testing, and cancer screening.

In addition to the tens of thousands of U.S. doctors and hospitals providing this care, there were 1,048 federally qualified health centers in the U.S. providing women cancer screening, contraception, and STI testing. An article in the New England Journal of Medicine estimated that as many as 40 million Americans may come to rely on these community health centers as a result of the new federal health care law's provisions and funding for such centers. Currently 5 percent of all Americans rely upon them.

V. Recent exposés of Planned Parenthood clinics in several states have revealed that the organization suffers significant structural problems, and a disregard for women's human and civil rights, as well as for laws protecting minor girls.

VI. Abortion and birth control are constitutionally protected services. Defunding Planned Parenthood cannot change this fact, or deprive Planned Parenthood of their freedom to continue to provide these services.

Barna: Tough to bump Obama in '12

The Barna Group, a top marketing research group, says it is going to be tough for any Republican candidate to defeat President Barack Obama, given what it sees today. Founder George Barna explains.

"Things don't always stay the way they are," he says, "but what we find is that the dominant Republican prospective candidates at this point -- Gingrich, Huckabee, Palin, Romney, Ron Paul -- all have things going for them, but it's going to be an uphill battle to win the White House."

Barna says President Obama's strengths include his incumbency and money, not to mention the mainstream media that Barna says "love[s] him to death. You don't really necessarily get full reporting on everything, he's a great campaigner, [he's] very charismatic out on the stump and he's got his party's support," the pollster says.

Barna remarks that when compared to the war Republicans likely will wage on each other to get the nomination, whoever winds up in the general election could be "bloody and half-poor" by that point.

The Barna Group's recent survey measured "Christian preferences" for the GOP 2012 presidential nomination -- and found that while Sarah Palin had the highest level of name recognition, she also garnered the highest "unfavorable" ratings among both Protestants and Catholics.

"If the election for president were held today, Mr. Obama stands a better-than-even chance of being re-elected," says the Barna survey. "Of course, his chances depend on the identity of his opponent, and the survey showed that Mrs. Palin would be the easiest opponent for him to defeat, while Mr. Huckabee would be the toughest adversary."

Barna stresses that at 20 months away, it is still an "open race" -- but "people are watching the prospective candidates and forming their opinions."
