

The Easter Week: Insights to Dilemma

Have you ever wondered about the “math” of the Easter week? The following commentary by F. LaGard Smith is taken from The Narrated Bible, which is also available in a Daily Bible version (NIV). I think you will enjoy reading it. The Editor

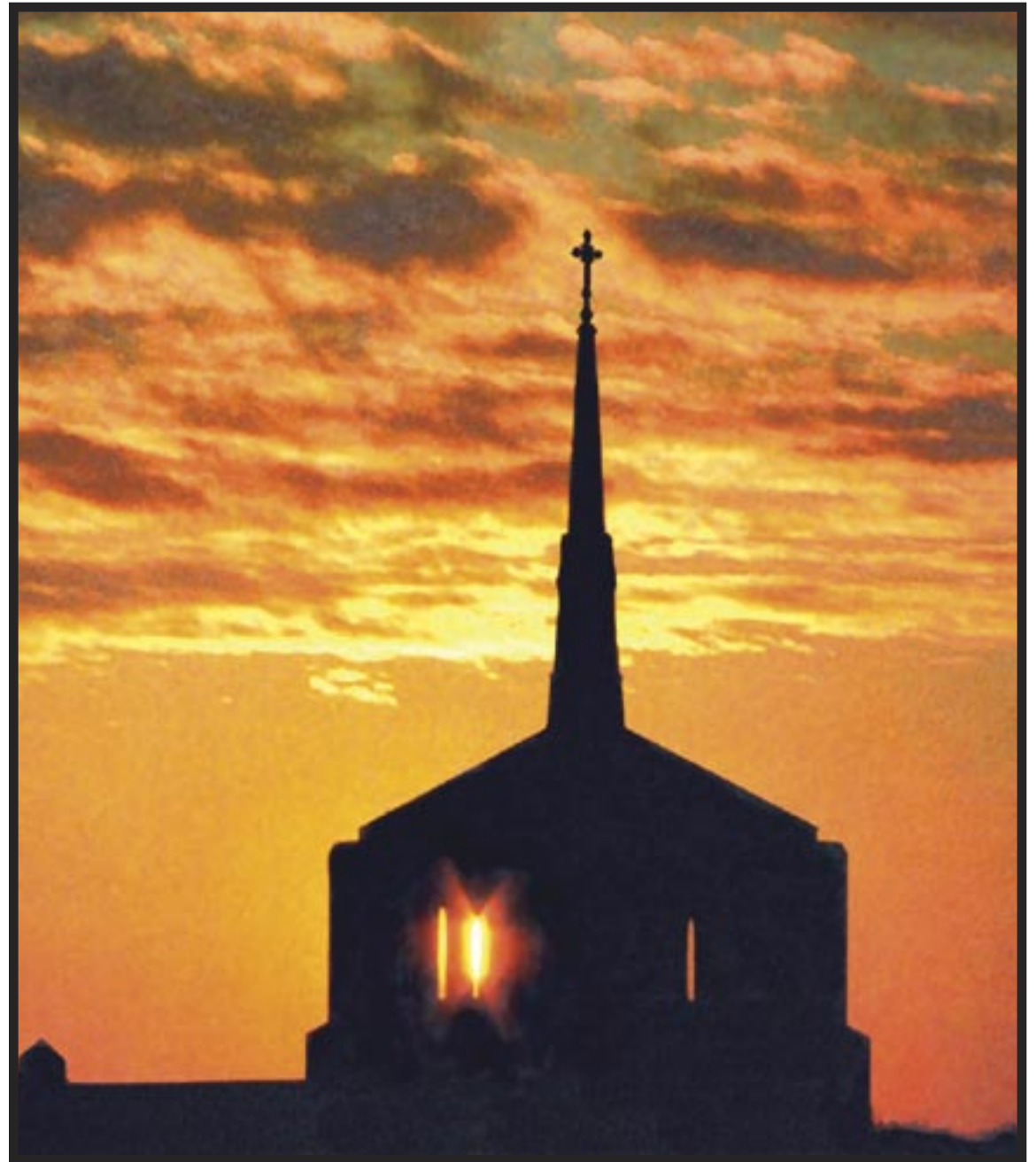
The preceding events of this final week appear to be accounted for by the Gospel writers within the clear context of either Sunday, Monday, or Tuesday, just as they have been presented. The exact timing of what happens after those events, however, appears less certain. John in particular touches only lightly on the events between Jesus’ triumphant entry and the so – called “last supper” which Jesus shares with his disciples. Referring to various public reactions during that time, John notes that, despite Jesus’ teaching and miraculous works, there are still many people who disbelieve or are afraid to acknowledge their belief. Then John records what is apparently Jesus’ last public appeal before his subsequent arrest. As there is no evidence that these events occurred on any of the prior three days, they are set forth here as occurring on Wednesday, though that time frame is only speculative.

Of far greater significance at this point is the chronology

related to the last supper, Jesus’ crucifixion, and his subsequent resurrection. Traditionally the last supper is believed to have occurred on Thursday evening, followed by the crucifixion on Friday afternoon and the resurrection on Sunday morning.

However, such reckoning raises at least two questions. First, in an action-packed final week, what reason is there to believe that there would be a whole day of actual inactivity or activity which is left unrecorded? Second, and far more important – if Jesus is crucified on Friday afternoon and thereafter hurriedly put in the tomb, how can there be sufficient time to match Jesus’ own prediction that he would remain in the tomb for three days and three nights before being resurrected? Even if one stretches imagination within the traditional time frame in order to find parts of three days, it is not possible to find three nights.

The resolution of both



questions appears to be found in recognizing that the last supper took place on Wednesday evening, followed by the crucifixion and burial on Thursday. Acceptance of that assumption requires an understanding the Passover, the Feast of Unleavened Bread, and the way in which the Jews reckon time. As for the reckoning of time, the Jewish day begins at sunset on the previous evening. This means, for example,

that our Wednesday night is actually Thursday, and our Thursday night is actually Friday.

Passover is observed on the 14th day of the month of Nisan, corresponding to March – April. As noted earlier, Passover is observed in commemoration of the deliverance of the ancient Israelites from their Egyptian bondage. The name derives from the “passing over” of the

Israelites when death came to the firstborn of each Egyptian family.

As part of that same commemoration, Passover is followed by the seven-day Feast of Unleavened Bread, which reminds the Jews of their forefathers’ flight from Egypt, during which time the Israelites ate unleavened bread only. (It is common among the Jews

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Truth always emerges from fair debate. On April 19th, thousands of students nationwide will participate in the annual Day of Truth® initiative, which was established three years ago by the Alliance Defense Fund to counter the promotion of the homosexual agenda in schools and respectfully express an opposing viewpoint from a Christian perspective. Each year the project grows in stature and importance, and we are excited about the prospects for 2007.

For more than a decade, the Gay, Lesbian, Straight Educational Network (GLSEN) has sponsored its nationwide "Day of Silence" program to promote acceptance of homosexual behavior in public schools. During this year's event on April 18th, kids will be instructed once again to remain silent and not to talk or even respond to fellow students, teachers, and administrators' questions. According to a recent Day of Silence handbook (p. 13, #6), students were also instructed to "brainstorm a list of all of the people who are likely to stand in your way." They were told that the list "should include teachers, counselors and administrators" and "peers, relatives, school board members and people in the community" who "have shown intolerance" to the homosexual agenda. GLSEN guidelines then led participating students to consider these other kids, parents, and neighbors "as, you guessed it, your opponents."

If that "enemy's list" sounds more like hostility than "tolerance," it is. While Day of Truth participants have utilized their First Amendment rights for the past two years to peacefully share their message of respect—that God's love is the ultimate antidote for all detrimental personal and social behavior—in many places these students have been scorned, intimidated, and threatened. Last year, at Weaver Academy in Greensborough, North Carolina, a student who posted Day of Truth flyers on school bulletin boards had her posters defaced by graffiti and her leaflets ripped up and discarded, while the Day of Silence materials were untouched. At Plattsburgh High School in Plattsburgh, New York, students were prohibited from posting their Day of Truth flyers, while the Day

of Silence was endorsed and encouraged by school officials.

These situations highlight the need for the Day of Truth. For the past few years, many Christian students who have attempted to engage in balanced dialogue and open debate in response to GLSEN's agenda have been reprimanded or even suspended from school. Now, students with a traditional viewpoint can organize and lead their own annual First Amendment exercise, with the legal and moral support of Day of Truth sponsors, the Alliance Defense Fund, Focus on the Family, the Southern Baptist Convention, Dare2Share, and others. Thankfully, free speech can once again be equally secured for all.

Day of Truth participants are encouraged to wear T-shirts and pass out cards (not during class time) with the following message:

I am speaking the Truth to
break the silence.
Silence isn't freedom.

It's a constraint. Truth tolerates open discussion, because the Truth emerges when healthy discourse is allowed.

By proclaiming the Truth in love, hurts will be halted, hearts will be healed, and lives will be saved.

The time for this message is urgent. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), homosexual behavior is the leading cause of the transmission of the HIV/AIDS virus. Through 2003, over 440,000 cases occurred through homosexual sex. While the advocates of homosexual behavior have admitted to specifically targeting public schools as a key part of their overall strategy to change how our society perceives their lifestyle choices, the CDC estimates that at least half of all new HIV infections are among people under age 25.

It is only fair to allow the Christian viewpoint to be heard. Students can't be expected to make healthy, informed decisions, if they are only being told one side of a story. Left unchecked, the homosexual advocates' relentless indoctrination of impressionable school children has been largely successful. Just a few years ago, Zogby International released a poll that found that 85 percent of high school seniors thought homosexual couples should be allowed to adopt children, and over

60 percent thought same-sex "marriage" should be allowed. Even 80 percent of evangelical Christian students supported so-called "hate crimes" legislation, which in its many proposed forms, may well be used to silence religious speech about homosexual behavior.

All sins are wicked in the eyes of God, and we are all sinners in need of the Savior's grace. The Bible is clear in its condemnation of adultery, false witness, theft, and murder, to name just a few. However, there is no organized activist movement that exists worldwide today to legalize and encourage theft, adultery, or lying. But there is a mobilized movement that challenges God's truth on a daily basis with regard to homosexual behavior. That is why the response of the Day of Truth initiative is so important. We look forward to this year's event, and expect that as word travels, more and more kids will be emboldened, and even more set free, by the Truth.

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The “Food Combining” Myth

“Food combining” is the idea that eating or avoiding certain combinations of foods will ensure optimum health.

There are two main schools of thought in regards to food combining.

A. We must control our internal pH by balancing our intake of acidic and alkaline foods.

B. Certain combinations of food, such as starches and proteins, are unhealthy if eaten at the same meal.

Let’s examine Point A first: We must control our internal acid/alkaline balance via certain food combinations.

Dr. W. H. Hay first proposed this theory at the turn of the 20th century, and his ideas have been popularized in the book *Fit for Life*.

This theory claims most of us are “overly acidic” due to all the “acid forming foods” we eat. The main acid-forming culprit, according to this theory, is that longtime dietary scoundrel known as meat.

We’re further told that dietary salvation from an over acid state, is a diet based on “cleansing” and “alkalizing” fruits and vegetables. In other words, the closer you are to vegetarianism, the more alkaline and supposedly

healthier you’ll be.

But the body’s internal pH balance is tightly regulated via several complex feedback mechanisms. Your dietary intake of acid or alkaline foods does little to override these mechanism’s ability to maintain a proper internal pH balance of about 7.41 – though there are slight fluctuations during each 24-hour period. We’re generally more acidic at dawn and most alkaline at sunset.

The body is smart enough to know that any significant deviation from its optimum internal pH would be deadly. It therefore does an exquisite job of maintaining proper pH balance... regardless of how acidic or alkaline our food is.

Bring on the steak and burgers!

Let me repeat...any extreme deviation from a proper internal pH is fatal; therefore the body does not allow such deviations. I’m not saying there’s no such thing as chronic acidosis or alkalosis, but such medical conditions are very rare.

Ironically, avoiding meat and protein can actually disrupt the body’s ability to maintain proper internal pH. Protein is critical for the health of the lungs and kidneys, both of which help regulate internal pH.

The other school of thought

regarding food combining - Part B:

This one claims that certain combinations of food, such as protein and carbohydrates, will interfere with digestion. This theory is also false. The authors of *Fit for Life* (I’m absolutely dismayed by the popularity of this book.) point to the difficulty many people have digesting beans as proof of this theory.

They claim that beans are hard to digest because they’re a food which combines protein and starches.

Gee, I guess God really messed up when he made beans. What was He thinking?!

Well, God didn’t mess up when he made beans. Difficulty digesting beans is due to improper preparation of beans; not because of some deadly combination of protein and starch.

In fact, the problem with improperly prepared beans is because of two complex sugars found in beans, called farrinose and stachyose. These two sugars can be tough to digest, but SOAKING beans breaks down these starches.

And by the way...Jesus did not make a bad dietary decision by feeding the masses that miraculous and tasty combination of starch and animal protein, known

as loaves & fishes.

I think I’ll take his dietary advice over that of fad diet book authors.

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Local Medical Missions Opportunity

Having the privilege of caring for the medical needs of many Christians throughout our community, I have been made aware of some of the excellent medical mission efforts in which our churches participate. These efforts have been literally world-wide and support short-term and ongoing missionary work. Universally, I hear of the personal blessings received by those who give of their time, effort, and funds serving in the name of Our Savior, Jesus Christ. Unfortunately, for many of us, it is difficult to participate frequently and it's only every 1-2 years that we

might have the opportunity to go. Did you know that an excellent opportunity for local medical mission work is now available?

As you might know, the Shreveport Bossier Rescue Mission is a Christian organization dedicated to helping those they serve become independent, productive citizens by providing temporary emergency care and ongoing programs that include: Homeless Intervention Services, Work Assistance, Discipleship Training, Drug & Alcohol Rehabilitation, and Handicap Services.

For several years, Dr. Nancy Germany and I, along with

the help of Bob Kufahl, have been able to man a small clinic at the Texas St. location on Monday mornings and to provide health screening on the weekends. This, however, will all change when the new 29,000 square-foot facility on McNeil St. is fully occupied. Willis Knighton generously has provided funding for the construction of spacious medical facilities within, including 4 medical exam rooms and 2 dental suites. Willis Knighton is now outfitting the clinics with needed cabinetry, equipment and supplies. Local Dentists, Mack Lattier, John Stafford, and Gary Chumley have begun

to equip the dental suites. How can we begin to meet the medical needs of this number of individuals? Should we even try to do so with all the other medical care available in our area?

I will answer the last question first. If any of your have sought care at one of our local emergency departments, you will know that, frequently they are quite overburdened. Many of the visits to the ER's are not truly emergencies and can be handled at a lower level of care. Free and federally-subsidized clinics are available, but these are also busy, and transportation to them from the mission is problematic. Certainly we will not be able to replicate all the services available at these other centers, but some essential care can be delivered on site using "local medical mission" strategy.

I suggest that local evangelistic churches assist at the new mission by periodically sending teams of volunteers to work weeknights and Saturday mornings at the clinics. These teams should be organized at the church level and include at least one physician. The physician could be assisted by others, including nurses, pharmacists, therapists, and other allied health professionals. There is also a need for clerical help and for members of the team to talk with and pray for the mission clients. In short, the make-up of the team will be much like that of any medical mission trip.

Medical services provided will include, but will not be limited to: 1) Diagnosis and treatment of minor medical complaints and injuries 2) Diagnosis, initial treatment, and referral for

serious medical illnesses 3) Counseling regarding existing medical problems 4) Assistance with obtaining medications prescribed elsewhere 5) Assistance in filling out paperwork for those needing bus passes, commercial driver's licenses etc.

Is it worthwhile providing limited services at the SBRM? It is notable that Jesus Christ commended even the giving of a cup of water in a ministry setting. Our providing compassionate care in the name of Christ will do much to assist in the overall impact that the SBRM has on lives in our area. Our churches will have the opportunity to interact with some of the most needy in the community and help them obtain the independence and spiritual guidance they desire.

I am asking for commitments from local churches to staff clinics twice weekly (approximately 8/month). Time slots available would be Monday, Tuesday or Thursday nights or Saturday mornings. If we have 16 willing churches, rotation would allow for a clinic every two months. If a church rotated personnel, an individual might only have to do this several times yearly. As with the world-wide efforts, blessing will also be yours to receive. Please pray about participation, and if interested or if you have questions contact me at my office 318 621-2929, or contact Mission Director, Henry Martin at 227-2868. If you would like a tour of the clinic facilities, this could be arranged.

You may remember reading about this couple 2 years ago when they first headed off to Mozambique after years of training and language studies, to finally start their mission service with New Tribes Mission. Franz, who is from Germany met Emily (a local gal from Stonewall) in England while attending the New Tribes Mission Bible School. God blessed them by bringing them together and He has also blessed the Penners with a lovely and growing young family. Their 4 children, Luke, Lian, Lael and Leif are eager to welcome their new sibling the end of April. The following is an update on the work and everyday life there.

Targeted!?

For almost a full year we lived fairly peaceably in Nampula, Mozambique. Then one night there was an attempted break-in

into our bedroom. When I realized what the noise was and saw the light shining on our bed I began banging on Franz to wake up. He is a hard guy to wake up and then was no exception. He eventually got up, turned on a few lights then got back into bed. I don't think I slept the rest of the night.



Early the following morning I discovered the double paned windows both open. Thank the Lord that was as far as they got. Now Franz believed me – there really had been a thief (or several)!

A month later we were targeted again. All of our much need electronics were stolen. In Europe and North America we consider ourselves as regular folks, not “wealthy”, not people who own coveted stuff. Then we went to Africa and suddenly our pitiful possessions were objects of desire to a people who will steal each others broken pots, ragged clothes and rusty bicycles. Suddenly we were a “wealthy westerner.” God protected us, and that is the main thing! Possessions are replaceable.

For several months I was always asking myself, “Ok, should I hide this thing? How important is it to me?” As time passed and only by God's grace I was able to relax again, but it did take some time! God gives His grace and peace.

Well, this was one unpleasant experience, but there are also encouraging

But that is not the extent of our involvement. After Jesus said to make disciples of all nations and baptize them, He said to teach them His whole counsel. So wherever New Tribes Missionaries go, their goal is to see a church established that has His Word in the heart language of the people, to see trained leaders and



the language and culture of their respective people groups, so that they can translate the Word and then teach it. It is a long process, but we know that the Lord is building His church. Please pray for these missionaries in the villages.

In the near future we trust the Lord to send out more missionaries from our team to the Nathebo people. This past February some of our co-workers conducted a survey into that group and initial contact was made. We would appreciate your prayers as we venture into this people group.

In Town
As a team we rent a building that functions as a guest house and an office. Normally when missionaries arrive in Mozambique, they have learned Portuguese, the national language, but they will have to learn more about the national culture and become familiar with the country. After a time of orientation they receive their assignment to either go into a people group or to have a support ministry - doing whatever is necessary to keep the missionaries in

the village.
As our missionaries in town attend various churches we hope to have an input and be able to teach them how to do cross cultural ministry in their own country. The Lord has blessed our team with good relationships with local pastors and others around town, and although it is a fairly slow go, we are seeing progress in this area.

Our ministry – support!!
Franz is the Administrator and Government Representative. This includes managing the office and some personnel and taking care of all the legal documents, i.e. visas and residential permits. It is very important that our

organization stay “above board before the government - otherwise they could find reason to “kick us out”. Franz also managed the finances for the team with someone else helping with the bookkeeping. It is a privilege to visit those in the villages to encourage them and see what else they might be in need of.

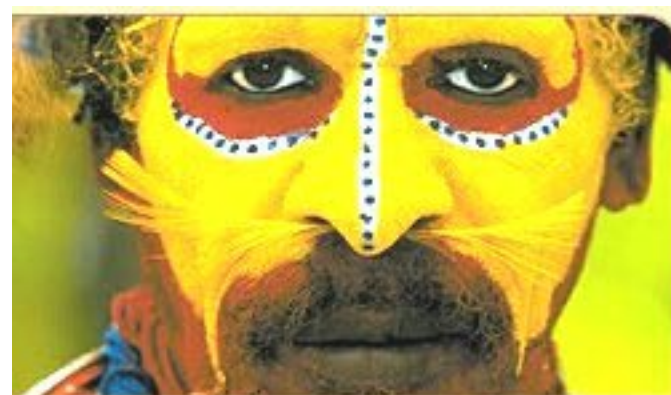
My main ministry is to care for our family and home. I also enjoy sending care packages to the missionaries in the villages and extending hospitality to our teammates and other missionaries.

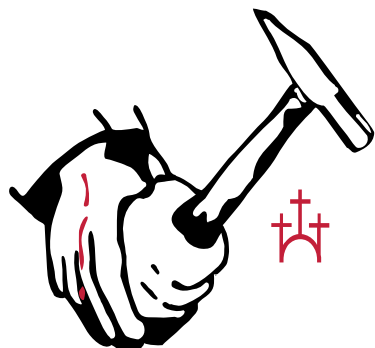

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

of Jesus' day to refer to both celebrations by only one name, either as "Passover" or the "Feast of Unleavened Bread.") By God's direction (Leviticus 23), a lamb is to be slaughtered late on the 14th day (Passover) and the Passover meal eaten that evening, which would be the beginning of the 15th day, the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread. The entire 15th day is then to be observed as a special Sabbath, or high holy day, regardless of the day of the week on which it might fall in any given year. (If the 15th is a Friday, then both that Friday and the next day, Saturday, are observed as Sabbaths.)

With that background the picture begins to come clear. Matthew, Mark, and Luke record the disciples' preparation for the Passover on the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. That would place their preparations, then, at the beginning of the 14th day, which, of course, begins on the evening of the 13th day. (Among the preparations common on the evening of the 13th day is the removal of all leaven from the house.)

Therefore it appears that the disciples assume they are preparing the upper room primarily for the special paschal which they expect to share with Jesus the following evening, and they apparently do not contemplate that the regular meal on the first night will in fact be their "last supper" with Jesus.

Although generally referring

to the occasion as a part of the Passover celebration, Jesus seems to explain why it is important for him to eat with them on the night before the actual Passover meal. As will be seen, Jesus' words are: "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God." In referring to his suffering, Jesus is obviously anticipating that his own sacrificial death will take place later that day, preventing him from participating in the actual Passover supper.

John's account eliminates any doubt that this supper occurred prior to the actual Passover meal. When Jesus tells Judas during the supper to do what he is about to do, some of the other disciples "thought Jesus was telling him to buy what was needed for the Feast." Furthermore, the Jews who have obtained Jesus' arrest will not enter Pilate's palace for fear that they will be ceremonially unclean, and therefore unable to eat the Passover. Most convincing is the fact that the day of Jesus' crucifixion is plainly stated to be "the day of Preparation of Passover Week"- the day on which the paschal lamb is slain for the Passover meal taken during the evening of that day.

The most meaningful result of moving away from the traditional time-frame is seeing how Jesus' crucifixion becomes the perfect "type" of the Passover Lamb. Under Hebrew law, the paschal lamb is chosen on the tenth day and then "kept up" until the 14th day, when it is sacrificed for the sins of the people. If Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem is counted as the tenth day, Thursday would be the 14th day, and thus the day on which Jesus is crucified. Far more important than this possible parallel is the fact that Jesus, as the perfect Lamb of God, does not celebrate the Passover with some other ordinary sacrificial lamb, but rather becomes himself the Lamb who is slain - precisely at the appropriate hour!

There is therefore strong evidence that the last supper takes place on the evening prior to the Day of Preparation, which by modern reckoning would be Wednesday night. Proceeding upon that assumption, the events associated with this final Wednesday include not only Jesus' last public teaching, but also the account of Peter and John finding the upper room and making preparations for the Passover celebration.

Striving Versus Abiding

Unless the Lord builds the house, its builders labor in vain. - Psalm 127:1a

What does it mean for the Lord to build the house? It almost seems a contradiction when we consider that we might be the builders in this passage. God wants us to allow Him to build the house. He explains further:

Unless the Lord builds the house, its builders labor in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the watchmen stand guard in vain. In vain you rise early and stay up late, toiling for food to eat - for He grants sleep to those He loves (Psalm 127:1-2).

God is telling us there is a way of working without striving. There is a way to conduct business without sweating and toiling for outcome. His warning to each of us is to avoid thinking that outcome is based on our sweat and toil. Outcome is based on obedience. That outcome is sometimes more than we deserve. Sometimes it is less than we hoped for. His desire for

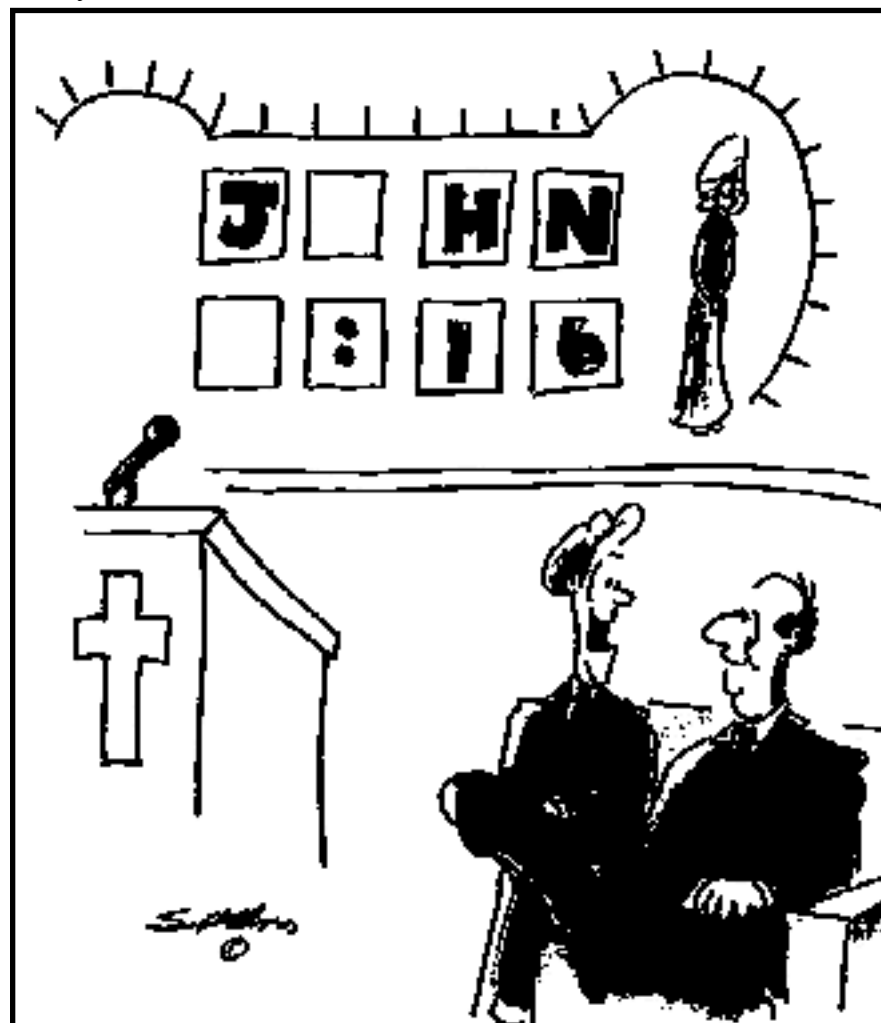
each of us is to see Him working in our daily work life. He wants us to avoid looking to our own effort to gain an outcome.

One day Jesus called out to Peter from the shore of the lake and suggested he throw his net on the other side of the boat. It was this simple act of obedience that yielded a tremendous catch that he would not have received unless he obeyed.

We are called to work; He is called to bring forth the

fruit. He is the vine. We are the branches. Fruit comes forth naturally from a healthy tree.

Today, ask God to show you when you enter into striving. Ask Him to show you the difference between loving trust and obedience and striving for outcome. It can be challenging for us to balance this in our daily work experience. He wants to help us walk in this freedom and rest.
