National Day of Prayer is Constitutional

On April 14, 2011, a panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals overturned a ruling that previously found the law requiring the President to proclaim a National Day of Prayer each year as unconstitutional. The U.S. Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit, based in Chicago, ruled 3-0 that the Freedom From Religion Foundation (FFRF) and its plaintiffs do not have standing to continue their challenge of the 1952 congressional act declaring an annual National Day of Prayer.

Pro-Lifer: Blacks 'Exterminating' Themselves

A pro-life advocate in Kansas is battling to fight the growing epidemic of abortion among blacks.

Reports indicate abortion is the leading cause of death within the African-American community in the U.S. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), since 1973 -- the year of the Supreme Court decision *Roe v. Wade* -- 13 million African-American lives have been lost to abortion.

Peggy Elliott Ministries was honored with a \$2,500 grant at the recent Servant Awards celebration in Wichita, Kansas. Dr. Peggy Elliott, ministry founder and president, says it is time for the genocide to stop.

"Between abortion and black-on-black crime, as a people group we're exterminating ourselves. We're not loving our children in the womb or outside of the womb," she shares. "So I have to do whatever it is that I can do to help save babies' lives and to make an impact on our culture."

"We've become a culture of death -- and I want to be one of those used by God to move us from a culture of death to a culture of life."

"Currently in Congress, every member of the Congressional Black Caucus identifies himself or herself as "pro-choice." Elliott laments that fact.

"Less than two percent of the African-American population is involved actively in the pro-life movement," she notes. "So any of the babies who have been saved -- our babies -- have been because there's been people who aren't concerned about the color. So [while] I say thank you to that...I also say it's time for my culture to wake up and to become involved."

Elliott, who is a minister, author, and conference speaker, says she is devoted to helping men and women in becoming who God created them to become. "We are the head of every criminal activity. We have more babies die from [Sudden Infant Death Syndrome] -- there's something wrong," says the ministry leader. "And I believe the something that's wrong is that we've moved away from our first love, which is Jesus Christ."

The Making of an
Encourager
How to Be a Guard Against
Discouragement and Despair in
Troubling Times

What does encouragement mean to you? Can you recall a time when someone came alongside you for the sole purpose of lifting your spirits?

Sometimes it takes only one word, a smile, or a grasp of the hand to hearten someone who is experiencing a trial. Sometimes it means standing by someone during a particularly hard time and helping him or her not give in to despair. It feels especially good to know you're loved in those low moments when you cannot see clearly ahead or when you don't understand God's perspective and vision for your life.

This is why the writer of Hebrews instructed his readers to help one another hold fast to their faith in God. He knew they would be tempted by trial and persecution to drift from the truth that God had plans for their lives. So he said, "Let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds" (Heb. 10:24). The Greek term translated "stimulate" literally means "to irritate" or to pressure one another to consider what the Lord has done in the past. He is faithful and does not abandon the work of His hands. We are His creations, and when we encounter difficulty, sorrow, rejection, or any other distress, we can know without a doubt that God will provide the wisdom and resources we need. Even in times of joy, He is blessed by happiness and contentment. In essence, the author was instructing his readers to spur one another along, to refuse to become ensnared by negativity, and to take responsibility for their lives in Christ as well as one another.

Have you ever done that for a hurting person?

The Lord has given each of us special tasks within the body of Christ, and those with the gift of exhortation or encouragement can rejoice in their unique ministries (Rom. 12:8). But encouragement isn't strictly the domain of those to whom the Lord has given a special gift—it is the wonderful, God-given function of everyone who belongs to Jesus Christ.

In the early days of the church, new believers badly needed encouragement. Societal pressures mounted, persecution multiplied, and few had access to the apostles' teaching (1 Thess. 3:1–10). Very often, encouragement for the early church came in the form of a person—such as Timothy visiting the Thessalonians. The same is true today. Sometimes just the sight of a loved one can reinvigorate your spirits and remove your focus from your troubles.

The ministry of encouragement is indispensable, both to you and to the body of Christ. There's no such thing as a person who doesn't need encouragement. By seeking ways to daily build up those with whom you interact, you further the potential for meaningful, Christ-centered relationships. As Paul told the persecuted Thessalonians, "Encourage one another and build up one another, just as you also are doing . . . admonish the unruly, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with everyone" (1 Thess. 5:11, 14).

Reversing Troublesome Trends, Part II

Recent earthquakes and tsunamis in Japan and wars in the Middle East show the vast amount of suffering and needs of humanity. Through many centuries various social and political strategies have emerged to end these troubles. Our own political scene is filled with proposals, yet amid this flood of self-help and self-fulfillment rages a national epidemic. Among the social ills are poverty and crime. Depression, suicide, and loneliness are more personal ones. Difficulty maintaining meaningful relationships and emptiness are often dealt with by drugs, alcohol and sexual obsessions. These destructive processes are spreading despite our high standard of living because economic and political "cures" do not address the underlying spiritual illness.

Jesus offered us the Way to confront life's difficulties. He said, "...I have come so that they might have life... more abundantly." (John 10:10) The troublesome symptoms within the church, as outlined in this column in the March issue of *The Bridge*, largely reflect social ills residing within the church. We haven't yet learned to live out this abundant life prescribed by Jesus. Recognizing these trends, Dallas Willard, Ph.D. and author of *The Spirit of the Disciplines*, offers spiritual disciplines as a way to help put Christians on the right path. These spiritual disciplines are the way Jesus lived and the way He taught His disciples how to live.

Disciplines are activities that assist us in acquiring Christ-like characteristics we need to help us become more like Him. Not every discipline immediately benefits us but it at least assists us in acquiring beneficial character. One such example is fasting, in which we might find a source of sustenance beyond food.

Dr. Willard lists two categories of spiritual disciplines. The first pertains to disciplines of abstinence. He includes these ways to abstain: solitude, silence, fasting, frugality, chastity, secrecy and sacrifice. The second category highlights the disciplines of engagement. These include study of the Bible, Christian doctrine, apologetics, and other subjects such as worship, celebration, service, prayer, fellowship, confession, and submission.

Jesus' example taught His disciples to follow these practices which helped transform them into devoted followers. How many of us abstain and engage like Jesus did? How many of us are following a specific plan to get on His path? Do you just go to worship service once a week and not participate in other spiritual disciplines? Do you ever withdraw into solitude and silence for fasting, prayer and study for more than 15 minutes? Are you knowledgeable about the Bible and its doctrines? Can you defend your faith and witness to others? Do you deny yourself luxuries you can afford or sacrifice time, energy and money that only you and God know about? Are there areas of service and missions you could do but purposely pass by? Do you submit to your pastor's wishes and requests? In the same way how could church leadership complain about the worldliness of its congregants if it hasn't provided the means and encouragement that might enable its members to pursue this life in the spirit?

"The non-disciple," says Dr. Willard, "... has something more important to do... than to become like Jesus Christ." He says non-discipleship costs abiding peace, a life of love, a faith of trust, and the power to do what is right while withstanding evil." Yes, there is human suffering and need in the world. The church can learn to address it by becoming more like Jesus.

The Hub Ministry

Have you ever been cold and hungry with nowhere to go? Have you ever been trapped in an industry that exploited your body? You probably shudder to think of yourself or your loved-ones in either of these situations, but for many in the Shreveport/Bossier area, this is how they live. One Shreveport local, Cassie Hammett, has developed a ministry designed to reach these people with the love and healing of Christ by connecting local Christians to those in need.

The Hub is an urban, gospel-based nonprofit that seeks to bring love and friendship to the poor by providing resources, conversation and care; always pointing to Jesus as the only source of complete healing and wholeness. The Hub has dozens of urban ministries designed to reach and help every area of the poverty-stricken and homeless population.

The Hub ministry started four years ago. “I knew that God had given me a heart for the poor,” Cassie said. “I also knew that I loved teaching others to care for the poor as well. So I dreamed up an idea to bring the two concepts together.” In her design for The Hub, Cassie created a unique way for the needs of the homeless to be met: by asking the local body of Christ to volunteer in service and ministry. Those of us with resources are asked to reach out in love to those without.

The Hub offers service and ministry in several areas that are easy for volunteers to get involved. In November 2010, The Hub opened The Basement in a building downtown. Designed as a refuge for people from the streets, it offers showers, laundry service, food, coffee and rest for people in the inner city. “It’s a place where they can gather their thoughts, escape from the stresses of life, and be taken care of. The people that we serve now feel like they have a place to call home.”

Also in the Basement is a fully-stocked food pantry. “By providing food, we are able to communicate that our God is the Great Provider,” Cassie said. Wednesday Bible Study and Discipleship teach Truth. Tutoring for inner city children is also offered at the Basement.

Lunch on the Street is a ministry designed to give volunteers who work downtown an easy opportunity to minister to someone on their lunch break. Each volunteer brings two lunches, one to eat and one to give away, then everyone sits and eats together. It’s an easy opportunity to provide for someone and have a conversation



about the love and provision of Christ. “We really believe that people come for the conversation and not the food!” Cassie said. Our hope is that friendships are formed and the seed of the Gospel is planted.”

Street Church is another Hub ministry. Once a month, there is a church service, complete with worship, scripture study and a hot meal. “We want them to understand the importance of the body of Christ as it exists in the fellowship of believers,” Cassie said. “We also hope to plug them into a local church that will love them and disciple them.”

Family Serve is the biggest monthly event The Hub offers. Located in the center of downtown Shreveport, it is designed to give local families the opportunity to serve together. “We truly believe that God commands us to love and serve no matter what our age!” Cassie said. Each attendee is given a hot meal, clothing, hygiene products and a city bus pass.

This spring, The Hub hopes to introduce a new ministry for women in the sex industry called Purchased. “It is a ministry for women working as exotic dancers, strippers and prostitutes, as well as women in sex trafficking situations.” The ministry will have two areas of focus, care packages filled with all the things girls love: nail polish, bubble bath, perfume, etc. The other will be on women victimized by sex trafficking. “This side of the ministry will have a goal of rescuing women, rehabilitating them and keeping them safe!” Cassie said.

There are many ways for those of us living in comparative luxury to get involved. “You can serve, give, fast and pray!” Cassie said. “God has



given you everything that you have. God wants to use all that He has given you to change lives.”

with The Hub!” Cassie said. “The events are designed with you, our volunteers, in mind. Volunteers are the lifeblood of this ministry. We are blessed by each person that serves side-by-side with us to reach people for Jesus.”

Aside from volunteering at events, you can get involved by donating, giving financially, praying and fasting. “Prayer is a very powerful weapon,” Cassie said. “We believe that our people and our city will not be changed without prayer.”

Looking for a practical way to help the homeless? Members of Trinity Baptist Church came up with an easy, safe way to minister to those in need: they call them Mercy Bags. The idea behind Mercy Bags is simple. Start collecting things a homeless person might need, things that we take for granted, such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, pull-tab tinned fruit or vegetables with a plastic spoon and fork, peanut butter crackers...the list goes on. (See below a list of other handy products.) Put some of these items in a gallon-sized plastic bag and carry them around in your car with you. Then pass them out to the homeless as you encounter them. Make sure you include a small Bible or simple tract outlining the love of Jesus, who was Himself homeless while on earth!

Second Camp Fights Selfishness With the Gospel

Unfortunately for today's youth, much of our modern technology and entertainment highlights self-promotion. Second Camp, a summer camp related to the "I am Second" movement, wants to teach the youth in Generation Z to put God and others above themselves.

Matt Parker, creator and director of Second Camp, hopes the camp will train youth to teach their peers the message of being "second."

Parker is also minister to students at Believers Bible Church in Corsicana, Texas. According to Parker, youth ministers will be able to spend plenty of time hanging out with their students because the Second Camp team will provide the entertaining activities and impactful worship services that often require ministers' attention during camp.

Youth groups from across the country are invited to participate. The camp costs \$250 per person, and will be held July 4 - 8, 2011, at Forest Glen Camps near Huntsville, Texas. The campground has "plenty of activities to keep campers busy all day, including swimming, a "blob," canoeing, and a challenge course with a zip line and a rock wall," according to Katie Smith, from the Forest Glen Advancement Team. The camp also



has athletic fields for plenty of wacky games and team activities.

Putting ourselves second is not easy. In Paul's letter to the Church at Philippi, he wrote, "Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind regard one another as more important than yourselves." For Parker, this required God's help. "It took a significant act of God to change my heart to put Him first and to view others as more important than myself, and I still struggle with that concept at times," he said.

The "Digital Generation" has not lived without blogs, social networking websites, and American Idol auditions. "Advertising and marketing have never been so pervasive and have told these kids that they are the most important and that their every desire is an inherent need," Parker said. Despite these obstacles, the Gospel still prevails. "Those who don't know Christ already are searching for that one thing that actually lives up to the hype," he explained. "The ones who have found it understand that He fulfills them like no product ever could."

The "I am Second" movement is providing speakers and training for Second Camp. "I am Second" started in Dallas, Texas, with businessman Norm Miller. "I am Second" uses videos, small groups, mission trips, and concerts to spread this idea. Celebrities such as Jason Castro, Anne Rice, Michael W. Smith, and Mike Huckabee have joined the movement by sharing video testimonials about their quest to be second.

Chris Plekenpol and Duche' Bradley, from "I am Second," will speak at Second Camp. Plekenpol struggled with the idea of being "second" while serving in the U.S. military. In combat, Plekenpol realized the depths of his sin and Jesus' love. "I'm not willing to go and risk my life for an enemy," Plekenpol said. "Yet Christ did that very thing for me." Plekenpol's video testimonial can be viewed at the "I am Second" website, www.iamsecond.com.

Bradley came to know Christ while serving a two and a half year prison term. After his term, Bradley graduated from a four-year university with a 4.0 grade point average. As an ambassador for the "I am Second" movement, Bradley takes the movement's message to groups throughout society, including boxers, X games competitors, and motorcycle groups.

Worship bands led by Chris Marchbanks and Wes Butler will lead students in meaningful worship.

"The Gospel is always an emphasis, and any teenager, believer or not, will find this a meaningful and fun camp experience," Parker said.
