**8 VOTING CONSIDERATIONS TO TAKE  
TO THE POLLS ON NOVEMBER 8,  
FROM DR. ALEX MCFARLAND**

*Study Finds That Election Has Awakened Urgency of Christian Conservatives; 98% Say Outcome Will Affect Their Lives*

**CHARLOTTE, N.C.** — As we approach one of the most headline-making elections in history, voters of all walks of faith are making careful considerations before heading to the polls.

Much like the “2016 Malaise Index” from Dr. Alex McFarland ([www.AlexMcFarland.com](http://www.AlexMcFarland.com)), a new study from the American Culture and Faith Institute has found that Christian conservatives say this election has awakened a new sense of urgency in them, with an enormous 98 percent reporting that the outcome of the election will make a difference in their life. The Institute tracks its research through the responses of SAGE Cons—Spiritually Active, Governance Engaged Conservatives—who, for this survey “have a mindset that there is no time to lose in leading America onto a different track for the future” and consider the 2016 election to be a major life event.

McFarland, a nationally known religion and culture expert, radio and television host, and author of the new book “Stand Strong America,” says that the Christian vote, especially in swing states, will make a huge difference in the results of the presidential election. ***“The more that the faithful speak their minds at the polls, the better chance we have of seeing a values-driven leader at the helm of our country,”*** McFarland said. ***“And the issues important to evangelical voters are certainly the hot-button issues for this election: the appointment of Supreme Court justices, religious liberties, the sanctity of life, marriage and foreign policy. No longer can the faithful remain silent when it comes to the leadership of our country. The evidence of taking a back seat in politics is clear; no longer can we sit by idly as constitutional, foundational and biblical principles are swept under the rug.”***

McFarland gives voters—especially those voters driven by their beliefs—eight considerations to make when they head to the polls on Nov. 8:

**1. Remember that “the perfect is the enemy of the good.”**

God can use any presidential candidate for His purpose; all candidates are flawed. Will we allow these flaws, which we all have, to cause us to cast a protest vote or not vote at all?

**2. Will my life be better or worse under this president?**

McFarland has been gathering responses for his own “2016 Malaise Index,” an online survey that gauges Americans’ outlook on society. More than 250 responses have been submitted at [www.AlexMcFarland.com/survey](http://www.AlexMcFarland.com/survey). While the survey is in its beginning stages, trends are evident. For example, when queried with the statement, “My outlook on the culture as a whole

compared to 10 years ago is...,” about 97 percent reported they felt “WORSE” about the culture, while the remaining respondents answered that they felt “BETTER” or “THE SAME.”

**3. Will this president protect my religious freedom?**

What are the candidates’ plans for preserving the religious liberties on which the country was founded, especially as more and more freedoms are being taken away?

**4. How will this candidate protect life?**

Abortion, euthanasia and other life matters have historically been important issues for voters—and 2016 is no different. While the Republican platform is one of the most pro-life in the party’s history, the Democratic platform asserts that a woman has the right to abort her unborn child—a black mark on the nation since Roe v. Wade in 1973.

**5. Will this candidate protect our country?**

With the 15th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks this month, the safety and defense of the country is of paramount importance. National security and recognition of those who seek to harm America must be a priority for the next president.

**6. Who will this president appoint to the Supreme Court?**

Appointments to the Court have longstanding impact and is perhaps one of the most important considerations of the election. Justices appointed under the next president—whether liberal or conservative—will make long-lasting decisions for several decades.

**7. Will this president protect the financial resources with which God has entrusted us?**

Many people are struggling in today’s economy, and many policies could be enacted to ease the financial burden on Americans. All human beings long to have the dignity that comes with providing for their family.

**8. Will I feel good about the decisions this president will make?**

Overall, will I still be proud that I voted the way I did in four or eight years? And more importantly, did I carefully consider my vote in prayer?

Of the SAGE Cons polls by the American Culture and Faith Institute, nearly three-quarters of them (71 percent) say the outcome of the election will make a “big difference” in their lives. “Various factors contribute to their concern about the election,” the Institute reported. “For starters, more than four out of five SAGE Cons (83 percent) say they are extremely or very proud to be an American. That contrasts with just two-thirds of the SAGE Cons (67 percent) who do not plan to vote for Donald Trump.”

## Remembering Phyllis Schlafly -- my revered (and misunderstood) aunt

Being Phyllis Schlafly's niece was a bit like watching Fox News instead of CBS: I was always presented with the "other" side of a controversial subject, the one

that's rarely heard but is hugely instructive. Because of her example, I've always known there's more to a sound bite than meets the eye.

For me, that's Phyllis's greatest legacy. I know that if I want truth, I have to dig to find it. I never assume that what I hear—whether it's my neighbor's comment or the newscaster's—is enough to establish an opinion.

Of course most Americans will remember Phyllis differently. A fire-brand conservative, she was both revered and reviled.

She was also misunderstood—which, to be fair, was largely of her own doing. Phyllis enjoyed making outlandish comments to rile the left. It was a bona fide sport.

The women in my family knew of only one way to succeed: hard work and sacrifice. They did not view marriage and motherhood as a liability; they did not believe American women were oppressed; and they did not believe in government overreach. So by definition, they couldn't have been feminists.

But the result is that her message was lost on everyday folks who didn't follow her work closely enough to take her comments with a grain of salt. Especially her comments about feminism. I've met very few women throughout my life who truly understood what Phyllis stood for when it came to that subject.

Allow me to clear it up.

Phyllis Schlafly was not a feminist. She fought against the cultural narrative that women are victims of men and of society and that we need government policies to help level the playing field.

This is no longer an unpopular view—most Americans do not consider themselves feminists. Indeed, it would be fair to say Phyllis was ahead of her time.

In fact, all the women in my family were. They were all highly educated; they were all "working women"; and they were all wives and mothers. But they didn't try to accomplish everything all at once, nor did they blame

men and society for whatever struggles they had along the way.

The women in my family knew of only one way to succeed: hard work and sacrifice. They did not view marriage and motherhood as a liability; they did not believe American women were oppressed; and they did not believe in government overreach. So by definition, they couldn't have been feminists.

Still, for most of Phyllis's life feminism was fashionable; and her countercultural stance caused people to describe her this way: "That's the woman who's against women's rights."

Phyllis Schlafly was not "against women's rights." She was against the feminist version of women's rights. I don't know anyone who's "against women's rights." But which rights, exactly, are we talking about? The phrase "women's rights" isn't a monolith.

An added problem Phyllis had was she wasn't your run-of-the-mill housewife, yet her arguments were in favor of the traditional family. This made some people view her as a hypocrite. I can see how, to the casual observer, it seems like a paradox. But a deeper understanding of Phyllis proves otherwise.

Despite her personal ambitions, Phyllis Schlafly had enormous respect for the work women do at home as wives and mothers and an excellent understanding of the family as the building block of society. That she chose to live differently than the typical housewife of her day doesn't negate that respect and understanding.

In some ways, I think Phyllis was envious of women who devoted their lives entirely to caring for home and children—precisely because she wasn't cut out for such a life. But she never told other women what they should or shouldn't do. She merely stood up for the homemaker role.

I see nothing duplicitous there.

What I do see is this: Phyllis Schlafly's life, not to mention my mother's and grandmother's, proves women don't need feminism to be happy or successful. Their lives demonstrated, to me anyway, that there's a completely different way to view women and their place in the world—one that's truly empowering.

"The feminist movement is not about success for women," Phyllis said in an interview with Time. "It is about treating women as victims and about telling women that you can't succeed because society is unfair to you, and I think that's a very unfortunate idea to put in the minds of young women because I believe women can do whatever they want."

## Defending the Faith - Linking Culture with Truth

### The Rise of Secularism A Humanistic Worldview

The very fabric of our culture is unraveling and the rate of unwinding seems to be accelerating. Some of the cultural changes are: the acceptance of gay marriage and adoption of children by gay couples, legalized physician assisted suicide in several states, abortion on demand, the suppression of (mainly Christian) religious beliefs, reassignment of gender identity, the takeover of college curriculum by liberal scholars, the liberal stranglehold on Hollywood and the list goes on. These ideological changes are not random events but part of the well-developed worldview which drives them, Secular Humanism, or Secularism for short.

In past years this column has primarily studied the worldview of Christianity and more recently Islam. Other worldviews are competing for the American mind and are discussed in the third edition of the book *Understanding the Times, A Survey of Competing Worldviews* by authors Jeff Myers and David Noebel. If you want to make better sense of the world around us, get a copy and start reading. It's superb! Every senior high school student about to leave home should be educated from this text. In *Understanding the Times (UTT)*, the Worldviews of Christianity, Islam, Secularism, Marxism, New spirituality and Postmodernism are compared and contrasted. These are the main "religions" in the US which are competing for the hearts and minds of impressionable American youth.

In *UTT* Secularism is defined as "an atheistic and materialistic worldview that advocates for a public society free from the influence of religion." Secular Humanism deals with the present age (now, but not eternity) and is concerned with humans only (not God). Where public policy is concerned, secularists are committed to materialism, the idea that only the physical universe exists. Since the spiritual world does not exist, any considerations of God or an afterlife are either misguided or dangerous. Since God does not exist, mankind is free to make up and change its own set of rules for this life. Such thinking renders the authority of Scripture and the US Constitution null and void since they are religiously based.

The secularist tactic in public debate is to portray themselves as neutral and unbiased and their opponents as evil or bigoted. In *UTT* an example is

used of the 2011 North Carolina law which defined marriage as a relationship occurring exclusively between one man and one woman. Newspaper headlines such as, "North Carolina--keeping hate alive", serve to ignore the issue and arguments pro and con about whether gay marriage is a good idea or not. Instead, this tactic uses propaganda, mass influence and manipulation to portray political opponents as hateful and bigoted.

*UTT* points out that secularist goals have included "a political philosophy concerned with the best way to govern complex, religiously pluralistic societies... Proponents of secularism have engaged in a century long project to develop scientific, historical, and even theological credibility to ensure... the dominant narrative of culture." What we see changing our culture now is not a recent conspiracy but a longstanding agenda being successfully implemented to change our culture. Antonio Gramsci (pronounced gram-she) was an Italian communist imprisoned by Mussolini in the 1930's because he believed in a method of taking over a country other than brute force like Mussolini did. Gramsci's prison writings outlined an alternative method. He said that before taking over a government and its military, the communists should first seek to dominate every major cultural institution; the lay press, radio, school administration and curriculum, the courts, the clergy and to alter family structure by separating children from parental influence. When the hearts and minds of the people fell in line with the narrative of communism, full control would be given over voluntarily without violence.

This agenda of materialism and secularism has been proceeding in our country now for many decades. The major institutions of our culture have all been affected to various degrees. Political parties, the major news outlets, the courts, public schools, Hollywood and entertainment, and nearly every university in the country operate from the worldview of secularism. Even the military has been infiltrated. In our culture, God is almost nowhere to be found. The degree and scope of secularist accomplishment in the past few decades has been breathtaking. Just recently the US Supreme Court upheld the legality of gay "marriage". See, we don't need God, we can decide right and wrong for ourselves! Psalm 11:8 says, "If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?" Brethren, the foundations are being destroyed!

Next issue, let's explore deeper into the history and beliefs of secularism to gain further understanding.

## The Burning Conviction of the Bohemian Reformer *The Martyrdom of Jan Hus*



At the center of the Old Town Square in the capital city of the Czech Republic stands a monument to one of its medieval citizens, the Bohemian reformer, Jan Hus. Born in what was known as Husinec, Bohemia in 1369, Hus would become not only a figure of national importance to the Czech nation but also an ideological forerunner to the Protestant Reformation. With great courage, impeccable character, and unquenchable passion, Hus held fast to his beliefs and challenged many moral and theological abuses in the medieval church. The reward of his resolve was martyrdom at a burning stake in accordance

with the condemnation passed down by the Council of Constance in 1415. He was declared a heretic by the council for challenging the authority of the church. When afforded the opportunity to recant, Hus chose death instead.

In modern times, Christians from various traditions have been inspired by Hus's courage and resolution. Protestant church historian, Bruce Shelley, writes, "Few scenes in church history are more touching than Hus's fidelity and refusal to swerve from absolute truth, even to save his life." In a similar vein, Pope John Paul II issued an apology at a 1999 symposium in Rome for Hus's brutal death and praised him for his "moral courage." This, of course, is not to suggest that there were not serious differences between Hus and those who put him to death. One does not get burned at the stake over *adiaphora*, that is, the "indifferent things." However, even those who would disagree with Hus should at least admire

the tenacity with which he held his convictions.

Hus is an imitable character of history and worthy of our attention, especially in the context of our present culture. As many in our day abandon moral absolutes and challenge the very nature of objective truth, the example of Hus should inspire us to recognize our core values and resolve to hold them dearly, even in the face of certain death. Hus's core values revolved around his commitment to the authority of God's Word. He, like the reformers that would follow him, held fast to the conviction that God's Word was clear and authoritative, especially in matters of morality. As Hus ministered in a culture plagued by institutional oppression and moral corruption, he served as a clear and unwavering witness to truth. Not even fire was able to silence the Bohemian reformer, for his legacy continues even to this day.

So what about you? What is the truth that captivates you? That is worthy of the giving of your life? That you would refuse to renounce, even as the flames rise? Do you possess such a conviction? You might not agree with Hus on every detail, but I commend him to you as an example of conviction and constancy in the face of oppression, intolerance, and persecution. As our culture becomes more openly hostile toward Christians, we will need examples like Hus that remind us that some truths are worth the trials, even the fiery ones.

For those who would like to know more about the life of Jan Hus, be sure to check out the work of David Schaff, entitled, "*John Huss - His Life, Teachings, and Death - After Five Hundred Years.*" Although the work was written in 1915, it is still an invaluable source. In addition to Schaff's work, Matthew Spinka and Thomas Fudge have also written respectively on various aspects of Hus' life and work. Beyond general surveys of church history, I commend these particular works to intrigued readers.
