Louisiana Flood Recovery

The three most important things Louisiana flood survivors should do right now:

- 1) Register
- 2) Register
- 3) Register

There is a deadline, and it's coming up this month: Monday, June 13.

You don't have to register three times, of course, but we want to stress how important it is. Even if you have insurance or don't have very much damage, why risk missing available help? Especially in flood events, damage often shows up well after the storm. Anyone who sustained damage in a designated parish should register.

You can register either by going to DisasterAssistance.gov or calling 800-621-3362. You can go to the website anytime; the telephone service is active from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Central Time.

You should contact your insurance company, but you don't have to wait until after you've done that to register with us. You shouldn't wait to start clean-up or repairs before contacting FEMA, either. You should document your damage with photos, but we want you back in your home as soon as possible – as soon as it's safe, sanitary and secure.

File insurance claims by calling your agent. This includes flood damage, if you have flood insurance. However, if you have questions about your

flood policy you can call us directly at 800-621-3362 and press Option 2.

Most casework is by phone and mail. Early in a recovery though, the volume and type of interactions can make in-person a better option. That's why we open Disaster Recovery Centers. At this writing, May 27, there are four in Louisiana, but that will change. You can find current DRC locations at <http://asd.fema.gov/inter/locator/home.htm>. Once you are registered, the 800-621-3362 number will always be there to help.

We may refer you to the U.S. Small Business Administration. If you get an SBA application, please fill it out and send it in. You may be offered a loan, but if you are, it will be at a very low interest rate, and you don't have to take it. If you are not offered a loan, you may be referred back to FEMA for more grant options – but if you don't return a filled-out application, you will not be eligible for any new FEMA grants.

You will likely get a housing inspection. We schedule these by telephone, so please be sure the number we have is a good one for you now – even if you've been displaced. Inspectors working for FEMA or the SBA will always have a photo ID badge and will never ask you for money.

We have already heard about fraud. Know your contractor, and if you don't, then please check out the company with the state.

Finally, when you get a determination letter please read the whole letter. A statement that you are ineligible is not necessarily permanent, and if it is temporary, the letter will explain what needs to be done for you to become eligible.

Remember, don't self-deny. Register before June 13 and get the help available to you.

Banning Barbarism in Louisiana

Louisianians have always respected the sanctity of human life, and this week we have taken another large step to protect it. This latest step was long overdue.

When I introduced the Louisiana Unborn Child Protection from Dismemberment Act (HB 1081) this session, I expected it would pass by a wide bipartisan majority. But even I did not anticipate it would pass unanimously in the Louisiana House and 36-2 in the Senate. Thankfully, almost

everyone, including the governor who is signing the bill into law, immediately recognized this was the right thing to do.

This new law will finally ban the common and barbaric practice of “dismemberment” abortion in our state, so that abortion providers will no longer be allowed to cause the death of an unborn child by using tools to rip the child limb from limb in the womb.

If that last statement shocked you, I do not recommend you watch the videos of our legislative committees, where board certified physicians had to testify specifically about the brutal nature of the procedure and share several graphic medical illustrations. Perhaps most shocking is the fact that the National Abortion Federation Abortion Training Textbook admits this procedure accounts for 96% of all second trimester abortions in the U.S.—not because it is a safe procedure, but because it is cheaper and more convenient for the providers than other methods.

By the time most dismemberment abortions are performed, the unborn child has a beating heart and is making her own blood, often a different blood type than her mother’s. She has brain waves, legs, arms, eyelids, toes, and fingerprints. Every vital body organ is in place, and even teeth and fingernails have developed. The unborn child can turn her head, frown, kick, swim, and grasp objects placed in her hand. And, yes, she can feel pain.

According to Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals statistics, more than 1,000 unborn children every year in our state have been ripped limb from limb and killed by use of this horrific procedure. By God’s grace, that will happen here no longer.

My only regret is that the Legislature did not enact this ban years ago, especially since the dismemberment procedure has already been outlawed in most European nations. As I explained on the House floor, this legislation is more than a measure of good public policy—it is a statement about who we are as a people.

In Louisiana, we believe every human life is invaluable and worthy of protection, and no civil society should allow its unborn children to be ripped apart. Incredible as it seems, we needed a law to say that. We have it now.

Defending the Faith - Linking Culture with Truth

Understanding Islam (Part I) Fundamentals

While 1.6 billion Muslims rarely make evening news, radical Islam gets the headline almost daily. ISIS terrorists recently detonated a bomb in Bagdad killing 90. The airport bombing in Brussels occurred just a few weeks ago. Muslim emigration has become a campaign issue. There is a growing fear that more terrorist violence will occur in our communities.

News coverage of these issues tends to reflect a general ignorance of Islamic belief and practice of Muslims as well as differences among Muslim sects, or subgroups. With such superficial knowledge about Islam, it is difficult to fully comprehend the important issues in the national debate. Christians, especially, need to understand this religion to enable them to approach Muslims better with the gospel. Understanding more about Islam and its cultural background would be greatly helpful for the general populace. To that end, let's explore Islam. Three readily available resources will help us analyze this worldview. They are: Watchman Fellowship: www.watchman.org/profile (click on Islam); Understanding the Times (Summit Ministries); and Encountering the World of Islam: www.encounteringislam.org (click on "about the EWI textbook"). Other sources of information will be documented where needed.

Beginning in Medina, Arabia, in 622 AD, Muhammad, an Arabian trader who had fled from Mecca was pledged absolute loyalty from 70 devout followers. Islam which means "submission to Allah", was begun. Since then, those who submit to Allah and his prophet, Mohammad, are called Muslims. Muhammad began having revelations from the angel, Gabriel, which continued intermittently over the next 23 years and were preserved mainly by oral tradition before being compiled into the text of the Qur'an following Muhammad's death in 632 AD.

In the text of the Qur'an there are five requirements (pillars of Islam) an adherent must do to be called a Muslim:

1. Recite the shahada in Arabic, "There is no God but Allah, and Muhammad is his prophet."
2. Pray the Salat (ritual prayers) five times daily.
3. Fast (sawm) during daylight hours during the month of Ramadan.
4. Give alms (zakat) of 2.5% of wealth annually to the oppressed.
5. Make a pilgrimage (Hajj) to Mecca at least once during lifetime, if able.

Islam, however, is not just a set of religious beliefs but is an all-encompassing worldview of social, political and legal systems. Sharia law is the legal system of Islam derived through the understanding of four sources: the Qur'an, the Sunnah (recorded practices of Muhammad compiled fol-

lowing his death), Ijma' (consensus of the Islamic community), and Qiyas (analogical reasoning). Shariah law addresses acts that are commanded, forbidden, disapproved, recommended and indifferent. It proscribes activities like diet, hygiene, dress, prayer, contracts, business, crime and punishment. In Islam, Allah does not reveal himself but reveals only his laws which are not changeable or negotiable.

Other Islamic theological principles are less well known. For example, Muslims believe the following:

One God. Muslims are strict monotheists. To ascribe any other image, idol or person (like Jesus) to Allah is blasphemous, a sin called shirk.

Messengers. Throughout history, Allah has sent men as messengers, or prophets to point the way to himself. Muslims accept Abraham and Noah, for example. Jesus was also a prophet of Allah and Muhammad was the last and final prophet.

Scriptures. The writings of Abraham, Moses, and David are accepted, but have become corrupted. Only the Qur'an is the complete and final written revelation from Allah.

Day of Judgement. Each person's record of good and evil deeds and thoughts are accurately recorded. On judgment day, when the dead rise, their deeds will be weighed. Those with good outweighing evil will be welcomed into heaven; the bad cast into hell.

Sin. Each person is born without original sin or inherited virtue. The individual alone makes his own choices and bears full responsibility. No one can atone for his sins. Jesus, though a prophet is granted no higher status than other prophets and was never crucified because Allah could not allow this to occur to a prophet.

Salvation by belief and practice. Each person must work out his own salvation by both faith and action, with God guiding him.

Unreached not responsible. If anyone does not know about Islam at death, he is not held responsible.

Goodness of human nature. The basic nature of each person has more good than evil. There is no concept of original sin.

Qur'an as God's perfect word. Revealed to Muhammad by the angel, Gabriel, the Qur'an is the only true source of Islam. Only the words of the Qur'an in Arabic are authentic. This also keeps it from corruption.

The traditions of Muhammad. These, a second source of Islam, Muhammad's recorded actions, are the practical interpretations of the Qur'an.

Next time we will continue to explore Islam and also look into "radical Islam."

The Gift of Respect on Father's Day

Recently, my husband, Greg, and I were attending our weekly marriage group. The food was great, the company even better . . . but I have to confess that the teaching was difficult for me. Not because the teaching wasn't great, but because of the conviction it brought to my heart.

The primary verse presented that evening was familiar — Ephesians 5:33 where Paul teaches: «Let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband.» There it was, straight from the Word of God, teaching that men are called to love their wives and wives are called to respect their husbands. Now, don't get me wrong, I thought I respected my husband most of the time. However, as I sat quietly with Greg's hand in mine, I knew that this issue was something I wanted to really focus on during the summer months. I wanted to be intentional about respecting my husband, especially in front of our children.

Intentional honor

In all honesty, I don't intentionally dishonor or disrespect my husband. However, in the rush of life as I try to balance a million things at once, I often respond to him in harsh tones or with body language that screams disrespect. As the teacher discussed how our children are watching our every move, the conviction that night in our small-group gathering drove deeper in my heart. I had to ask myself if I was leading our kids to ultimately think that my behavior toward their dad in those moments was acceptable.

As I reflected even more on the verse that night, I realized there were times that I even justified my actions or words. I'd defend myself by saying, "I just needed his help with the kids —*now* — not in 30 minutes! So I increased my tone to intensify my immediate need." Or I'd clarify, "I was in a hurry to hang up because I had to pick up one of our kids from school." However, it says in Ephesians that wives are to respect their husbands, and I noticed that it didn't say *if* we have time or *when* we can think about it or even *when it's convenient*. I realized that it wasn't like I was premeditating disrespect or planning to be rude. I just let it happen in the craziness of my daily life.

As our small group closed for the evening, the facilitator asked us to contemplate what we could focus on over the summer months to strengthen our marriage relationship. Before he could even finish his sentence, my hand was in the air. I wanted to share what my focus would be for the summer. At the top of my list was to be intentional about respecting my husband. And my dear husband jokingly offered me a list of ways I could honor him — just to get me started on the right foot.

Practical honor

The Oxford dictionary defines *respect* as: "A feeling of deep admiration for someone or something elicited by their abilities, qualities or achievements." After pondering this definition, it became clear to me that I would need to regularly recognize what I most admired about Greg. Maybe I'd even need to keep a list of character qualities, abilities and achievements that I loved about him so I could refer to it regularly. It made me think of Luke 12:34, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." I understood that whatever I treasured about Greg (whether it was his sense of humor, his amazing ability to connect with our girls or his great work ethic), then

my heart would be there as well. I love the thought of that: I can respect my husband by making a choice, especially when I'm frustrated with him, *and* I can respect my husband as an overflow of the habit of my heart.

Maybe you, too, have become acutely aware of your desire to be more intentional in offering encouragement and respect to your husband. Maybe you would ultimately like to teach your kids to do the same. This Father's Day, I cannot help but think there's no greater gift for Dad than respect — both for the day and in the months that follow.

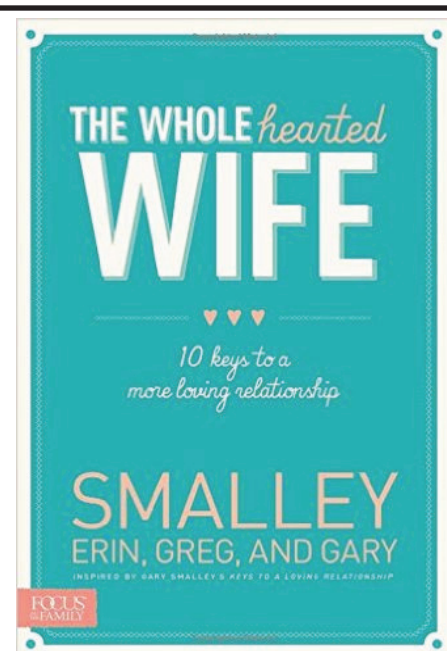
Here are a few things that might help with your endeavor:

- Every day be on the lookout for one thing in your husband's behavior for which you can praise him. It can be as simple as brushing his teeth. Or maybe it's his faithfulness to go to work each day and be a great provider. Or maybe it's simply emptying the dishwasher. If you look for praiseworthy behavior, you will find it! Consider writing it down on a list of what you most admire about your husband. Encourage your kids to do the same.
- Offer your husband words of encouragement and affirmation — maybe even at the dinner table in front of your children. Consider inviting your children to share as well.
- When you are alone with your kids, always talk positively about your husband. Tell them how much you appreciate their dad.
- When you blow it by speaking to your husband in dishonoring ways, simply "clean it up." Acknowledge that you were wrong and ask your husband to forgive you.
- Commit to honoring and respecting your husband, regardless of what he does or does not do in response to your respect. He is worthy of honor because his value does not change based on his behavior. Scripture makes it clear that a person's value does not change because of his or her actions (Genesis 1:27; Exodus 19:5; Isaiah 43:4).
- Ask the Lord for strength and self-control and for His love to abundantly flow through you toward your husband.

World's First Surviving Septuplets Who Sparked Abortion Debate Credit God After Graduating High School

The septuplets who sparked a nationwide abortion debate before their 1997 birth have graduated high school and credited their faith in God for allowing them to thrive despite overwhelming odds.

Kenny, Kelsey, Natalie, Brandon, Alexis, Nathan, and Joel accepted their diplomas at the Carlisle High School in Iowa, the Des Moines Register reported.

Their story quickly became national news back in November 1997, as they were the first set of septuplets to survive past infancy, all born weighing between two and four pounds.

Parents Bobbi and Kenny McCaughey used fertility drugs to conceive but rejected any idea of selection reduction upon learning that they would be having seven children instead of one or two, saying it was 'in God's hands.'

"I will always remember the day we found out there were so many," Bobbi recalled back in 2013. "It wasn't like 'yahoo!' There were so many doubts. To a lot of people this might sound trite, but God determined the outcome. We've built a good foundation that wouldn't have happened had that situation not occurred. So the message is let God use you. It doesn't have to be something that makes national news."

At the time, the family received generous donations including a 5,500-square-foot home, a van, a year's worth of Kraft's macaroni and cheese, and two year's worth of free diapers, according to the MailOnline.

Among the offers was a full ride to Hannibal-LaGrange University in Missouri, where some of the McCaughey children plan to attend following their graduation while others are headed for the military and some are choosing to go straight into the workforce, KCCI reported.

Two of the septuplets, Alexis and Nathan, have overcome overwhelming odds despite being born with forms of cerebral palsy: Nathan taught himself how to walk, and Alexis still uses a walker but went on to become the co-captain of her high school cheerleading squad. She is also a member of the National Honor Society.

Speaking to TODAY, the siblings said they are grateful for their large family, and credited their parents, friends, church, and family, along with their faith in God, for helping them through.

"I feel like I am starting my life," Kelsey told TODAY. "But they are my best friends. When you need someone to talk to, they are there to help you."

"What I'm not going to like is we won't be around each other," said Kenny. "I couldn't be where I am today without them."
