5 Ways to Get Your Child Interested in Politics...and Yes, It's Worth It

On a cold and clear January night in 1989, in what would be the last national address of his presidency, Ronald Reagan had some strong words for families across the United States.

"Let me offer lesson number one about America," he "All great change in America begins the dinner table. So, tomorrow night the kitchen I hope the talking begins. And children, if your parents haven't been teaching you what it means to be an American, let 'em know and nail 'em on it. That would be a very American thing to do!"

I remember watching the president's farewell address that night in our own family's living room on Long Island, my mom, dad and sister sitting by my side. I was in high school. It was a bit of a melancholy moment for me. Ronald Reagan was the only president I had really known. I had watched his inauguration in our third grade classroom. Only a few months later we prayed for his recovery from a would-be assassin's bullet. When he spoke to "the schoolchildren of America" following the Challenger disaster in 1986, I felt like he was talking directly to me.

As a child, I loved the pomp and pageantry of politics. Although I sometimes read headlines I didn't fully understand, I grew up knowing that civic engagement was important. Politics mattered because government policies impacted real people, for good or bad. As kids, we grew up hearing about the evils of abortion and slavery. And we were taught about the ordinary people who did extraordinary things to confront these types of injustices.

Different Day, Same Challenges

Twenty-seven years later, my wife and I find ourselves navigating the 2016 election with three young boys of our own by our side. Given the coarseness of our times, how do we instill the same values in them that our

parents instilled in us? How do we raise them to have an appreciation for the political process and cultivate a Christian worldview?

Let me suggest five ways:

- 1. **The Power of Example:** Values are more often caught then taught. Are you involved? Are you registered to vote? Our children are watching us. If you express cynicism or apathy, your kids will often echo those same words and attitudes. Lead by example. Take them with you to the primary or caucus.
- 2. **Talk Issues:** Since all three of our boys were adopted, we love to talk about our passion for protecting preborn life. As a result, our boys want to know which of the candidates feel likewise. It's critical that we help our children understand what issues matter to us as Christians and why.
- 3. Humanize Candidates & Officials: Remind your children that office holders and candidates are real people with real challenges who possess many of the same problems, hopes, dreams and fears that they do. Identify some common interests your child may have with them. Do some research on the candidates and find a trait or characteristic that your son or daughter might resonate with. Maybe "Candidate A" studied geology in college and your son loves rocks. Or maybe your daughter is in speech therapy and you learn that "Candidate B" overcame a stuttering disability in high school.
- 4. **Tell Stories:** The late novelist Umberto Eco once said that "To survive, you must tell stories." There's a reason Jesus taught in parables. History is not some dry recitation of facts. Instead, it's human drama and adventure of the highest order. Refresh your memory about God's hand in the founding of America; talk about it at the dinner table or at bedtime.
- 5. **Pray!** We must pray for our leaders with our children, heeding the words of the Apostle Paul, who urged "that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions" (1 Timothy 2:1-2). Praying for someone inevitably draws us closer to them and gives us a vested interest in their success.

Our goal as parents should be to help raise children who love the Lord and who will grow into adults who care about the future of our country. After all, in the end, I believe Daniel Webster was right when he said, "Whatever makes men good Christians, makes them good citizens."

Defending the Faith - Linking Culture with Truth

Euthanasia Healing to Homicide (part two) by Stephen R. Patton, M.D.

Last month, I began a discussion about euthanasia through an example of legalized physician assisted suicide (PAS) in Oregon last year. Proponents of PAS declare that pain relief and palliative care are insufficient for the terminally ill; active euthanasia should be offered to mentally competent patients throughout the US as a "right-to-die" (with dignity).

Recently, I attended a college debate about this issue. One debater, a proponent of PAS, denied that it was a slippery slope to more widespread application of euthanasia. He assured us that current laws were sufficient to restrict the practice to terminally ill but mentally competent patients. Then, almost in the same breath, he asserted his personal preference to see PAS laws broadened to patients with suffering but not terminally ill. Fellow believers, that is the slippery slope.

Consider the implications for abuse if the authority to euthanize is given to distant relatives who merely gain medical power of attorney over a helpless patient. What if inheritance of an estate poses a conflict of interest? What if this new ethic extends to the chronically ill or to the elderly with Alzheimer dementia? The psalmist said in Psalm 71:9, "Do not cast me away when I am old; do not forsake me when my strength is gone". What happens if the "right-to-die" changes to the "duty-to-die"? Should we be comforted by governments now reassuring us that current safeguards are in place to prevent such abuse? My father, now deceased, remembered when the federal government assured taxpayers that income taxes would never exceed three percent.

Consider the Netherlands where euthanasia has been practiced longer than in the US. In Holland, nearly thirteen percent of all deaths result from euthanasia. There it is often carried out on persons who simply have chronic or debilitating diseases. Sometimes individuals are euthanized without their permission and (unofficially) at other times, even without their knowledge.

If you don't think the Dutch practices can develop in the US, then consider the eugenics movement occurring in this country in the early 20th century. "Eugenics" meant perfecting humanity through manipulation of the human gene pool, a direct offshoot of Darwin's evolutionary ideas. People with "defective genetic backgrounds," mental illnesses, lower intelligence and even non-preferred race were targeted to prevent their propagation. Against their will, African American women were forcibly sterilized by court-ordered hysterectomies laughingly referred to as "Mississippi appendectomies".

In a 1927 Supreme Court decision, Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes ruled, "It is better for all the world, if instead of waiting to execute degenerate offspring for crime, or to let them starve for their imbecility, society can prevent those who are manifestly unfit from continuing their kind... Three generations of imbeciles are enough."

Margaret Sanger founded Planned Parenthood in that era promoting abortions primarily on African American women to control their population. She wrote, "We do not want the word to go out that we want to exterminate the Negro population."

The eugenics movement in America soon fell dormant. However, its European counterpart, Adolf Hitler, implemented his eugenics program striving to exterminate the Jews, declaring them unfit to live or propagate.

Those who fail to study history are destined to repeat it and PAS is just the forerunner of more medical ethics issues to come. Abortion, rationing of medical care, euthanasia, transplantation, end-of-life decisions and human cloning are all serious ethical dilemmas on the horizon in America. Guidance is needed now more than ever. What principles should we use to see us through these troubled waters? The Bible has much to say; more on this next time.

Why We Don't Keep Secrets In Our House {Child Abuse Prevention}

About a month ago, our family was having dinner with some friends at their house. I walked into the kitchen just as the other mom, while winking at me, handed my son a second cookie and whispered, "shhhh. It's a secret. Don't tell your mom." To my delight {and surprise}, my son exclaimed, "Oooooh, but we don't keep secrets in our house. We do surprises." In that moment I thought, he gets it and he's not afraid to say it, thank goodness.

You see, thanks to an excellent Sexual Abuse Prevention workshop that my husband and I attended, called Parenting Safe Children, we have a "no secrets" rule in our house. We have this rule because secrecy is a key ingredient to the sexual abuse of a child. In fact, sexual predators count on the fact that the child will keep a secret. Sometimes they even test the child by asking him to keep small, innocent secrets first to see if he will keep bigger ones later. So, when we teach our children that we don't keep secrets, even about small and seemingly harmless things like a cookie, we are also instilling in them that they don't have to keep big and unsafe secrets, like that of someone touching them inappropriately.

This other mom, the one who asked my son to keep the secret, is a friend of mine and I know that she meant no harm by it at all. Nonetheless, the interaction created a great opportunity for me to share with her about our Body Safety Rules {which we also adapted from the workshop}, one of which is that we don't keep secrets. I shared with her that we have "surprises" instead of secrets because surprises are something that you keep quiet about temporarily; then you share the surprise and people are happy. But secrets are meant to be kept quiet forever and they're often to protect something that would make people unhappy.

My friend asked me more about the Body Safety Rules – what they are, why we have them, where we keep them, how I talk about them with my kids – and I began to explain that we have Body Safety Rules in effort to keep our kids safe from sexual abuse, to empower our kids, and to communicate to others that our kids are off limits. I told her that we keep the rules posted front and center in our kitchen; that we went over each rule with our kids when we first made the sign and that we discuss them regularly as situations arise. For example, when I'm trying to get a moment of peace, or go to the bathroom by myself and one of them comes barging in, I remind them that because we're the bosses of our own bodies, we're allowed to have privacy when using the toilet. And {for the love} Mommy would like some privacy while going to the bathroom. Or when



we go to the pediatrician, I remind them, "no one is allowed to touch your private parts {which we call by their correct name}, but because the doctor is checking to make sure you are healthy, he needs to check your whole body, including your private parts and because Mommy is here, it is ok." We talk about the Body Safety Rules in the context of different every-day situations and we also sometimes play "what if" scenarios, like "what would you do if you were playing at someone's house and they asked you to take your clothes off?" My kids would likely respond, "I would tell them that we play with our clothes on."

When a child knows his body safety rules and feels empowered to say no to inappropriate touch and to keeping secrets, it communicates to a potential predator that the child is off limits. And when friends or child care providers see the Body Safety Rules hanging in our kitchen, it's obvious to them that sexual abuse prevention is on our radar. A conversation is usually quick to follow, sometimes it's comfortable and other times it's just plain awkward. But I simply have to ask myself, am I willing to have a moment of awkwardness with someone in order to have my child's back and keep him safe? The answer is always, without a doubt, Yes.



What if We Could STOP Prison's Revolving Door?

Answering the question seen in Matthew 25: 39-40, "When did we ever see you sick or in prison, and visit you?" Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Was Christ referring only to those Christian brothers and sisters imprisoned or was he also referring to those in prison who would become a Christian through the witness of a ministering believer?

A Bill Glass Prison Ministry postcard reads, "Ever been to prison? Wanna go?" Recently, one hundred seventy men and women answered yes to this call. They were saying yes to the March 4th-5th, Bill Glass "Behind the Walls Prison Event" which will equip them to go into Caddo Correctional Center, Bossier Maximum Security Facility, and the David Wade Correctional Center with the Bill Glass Prison Ministry Team.

Those of us involved in prison ministry are praying for many souls to be touched and drawn to Christ as the groups spend the day at these three correction facilities. In 2015 at the Bill Glass "Behind the Walls" one day event, 981 decisions for Christ were made by inmates in Shreveport-Bossier, LA. Since 1992, over 1,000,000 people have made professions of faith at Bill Glass prison ministry events.

Here's something else to pray about. Will you pray with us? These people who make decisions to follow Christ need more than one day of discipleship. More people are needed to work with them. Even if you have not been previously trained, there is training available at the correctional centers. There are opportunities through various programs to teach skills, build relationships and share the love of Christ with these new Christians and perhaps others along the way.

Chaplain Kevin Johnson at Caddo Correctional Center will have a training class in March for those who wish to volunteer. If you are interested in being a Spiritual Volunteer, you can get training dates and more information by calling Chaplain Johnson at 318-677-5254.



David Boone, Director of the Northwest Regional Re-entry Program at Caddo Corrections Center, will offer opportunities to serve in the areas of welding and carpentry. A two hour training class is being offered for anyone wishing to volunteer in his department. You can attend the class on Monday, March 14 from 6:00 till 8:00 p.m. or on Thursday, March 31, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.

Louisiana has the most incarcerated citizens and has the highest recidivism rate of any state in the U.S. With enough initial volunteers, Jobs for Life and Celebrate Recovery programs could also be held in these correctional facilities. Both have proven to dramatically reduce a relapse into criminal behavior and thus one's return to prison.

Jobs for Life and Celebrate Recovery prove successful because volunteers provide opportunity for those incarcerated to become accountability partners and even future class facilitators.

The dynamic Christ-centered Jobs for Life program changes lives by equipping people to get and keep a job. If interested in learning more about the FREE Jobs for Life program, visit the website www.jobsforlife.org. There are also two short videos available on YouTube. One is "What Is Jobs for Life?" The other is "Jobs for Life: Flip the List."

Celebrate Recovery's prison program is called CR Inside. It deals with

the whole person... every issue that keeps people from being who God created them to be. Find out more about it at www.cr-inside.org. Many people have found Christ going through this program.

Another outstanding prison ministry is one that the HUB in Shreveport has incorporated. It's called Purchased-Not for Sale. It offers training for people who wish to minister to victims of human trafficking and women in the sex trades industry. Their next training is Saturday, April 2nd, from 10:00 a.m. till 3:00 p.m. at the Lovewell Center, 605 Cotton Street, in downtown Shreveport. Are prisons overrun, in part, because we have ignored this call?
