

What Motherhood Taught Me about Living the High Life

I was always one of those women who is awkward around children. I remember vividly the look of horror on a friend's face when I told her babies were squishy and weird (I wasn't trying to be funny). To me, kids were smelly, slobbery, and way too inconvenient—to put it mildly. The idea of becoming a life support system for a completely dependent person dressed up in a tacky little sailor outfit seemed crazy. I didn't even try to understand where people were coming from on that one.

Then I got pregnant.

I walked out of the OB-GYN's office feeling strange. I knew my life was about to change in a most fundamental way, but I had no idea how. It was like packing your bags for a long trip without knowing where you're going. I placed the mint-green diaper bag full of formula samples and how-to books on the kitchen table and told my husband, "Well, we're having a baby."

He zoned out in front of the television: "Not to be rude, but can I just finish watching this game?" Aware that he was in a mild state of shock, I did not take offense at his response.

Later, he pressed, "Not to be rude, but are you sure?"

"Yeah."

"Really sure?"

"Yeah."

"Not to be rude, but I'm not going to really believe this till I get confirmation from a professional."

A couple of weeks later he went through the same dialogue with a nurse. She laughed at him.

Within about nine months, our little angel came into the world, and a seismic shift took place in me. The very day he was born, I became a different person. The natural resources we need to become parents lie dormant in the seedbed of our lives until the birthing process brings them into full bloom. I lay in my hospital bed listening to various cries from the nursery down the hall and knew i n s t i n c t ively which tiny voice was his. When the nurse took him away, I longed to be with him. Holding his fragile body, I realized for the first time that someone else was more important to me than myself.

When we fall in love, we experience a degree of intense devotion that Scripture calls "agape"—the stakes go up significantly, and we realize that we must choose to become completely vulnerable if we're ever going to taste the fruit of real love. We walk out on the limb and hopefully are rewarded. But still, there are limits to this love. There are always [certain] transgressions that, if committed, would seriously compromise our devotion.

With children it's different. There is nothing they can do to drive us away. And this is where the transformation takes place. If we can be defined by the choices we make, the daily life of a mother is telling. She spends the majority of her capital on her children without thought of compensation.

I remember shunning my own mother, after she'd driven several hours to see me in a college play. I had a boyfriend and wanted to spend time with him, so I left her alone in my apartment all evening while I attended cast parties. Before she went back home, we spent just enough time together for her to buy me a new hat in a boutique. Then I hugged her and said goodbye. At the time, I was vaguely aware of my obtuse behavior, but she never said anything about it.

My mother grew up in a boxcar. She remembers her mother making soap from lard and hanging newspapers on the walls for insulation. That

common woman passed her work ethic down to my mom, whom I regularly watched climb the long hill to our house in knee-deep snow when the car couldn't make it in. I thought of her as a beaten-down ox that kept going despite the odds. She was always a resource more than an ornament. More useful than comely. Only after I became a mother did my perspective deepen enough to see sublimity in the grace she extends to others.

How many of us really ever know our mothers? We see them standing at the kitchen sink, unloading the groceries, and mopping the floor. They're "mom," not Alexandra or Sophia or Juliette. They're the women who haggle over the price of yard sale items and nag their kids to clean their rooms, not people who contemplate Kierkegaard.

Yet I know in my own life, the relentless gale of desire is never quieted. After a long day of work, traffic, soccer practice, and dirty laundry, I fall into bed and hear the words of songs that once inspired me. I see the constellations of Andromeda and Orion. And I want more than I have. When morning comes, I go through my routine like Walter Mitty, thinking of things that aren't. I don't have the luxury of indulging these thoughts, though, so I harness myself to the proverbial plow and work.

I am not alone. I know a girl with two babies who once told me she was just too busy to cry. Are we our mothers? Maybe. But being a mom has taught me that I never saw the whole picture from the other side. Mother-hood has led me to places I'd never previously been. When my older son was three, I tried to sing to him. "Please stop," he said. "You're out of tune." That week I began searching for a music teacher. I settled on the violin since our house was too small for a piano.

Before long we were making regular trips across the state for lessons with a genuine Suzuki-Nazi. During one of my son's first days there, the instructor sent me to the bathroom with a wooden spoon and told me to spank him for squirming. I'm dreadfully ashamed to say that I scolded him. (There are so many mistakes with

the first). I'll never forget that day—even though he has. He finished the lesson stoically and learned to love his teacher. Although I became petty and resentful, he always rose above it and focused on the music.

Now there's nothing more I can teach him, so I sit in the kitchen and listen to the lilting notes of Mozart and marvel that they're coming from an 8-year-old's bow. Watching him learn to play the violin has taught me more than I learned in four years of seminary.

The paradox of parenthood is that we're the ones who should be teaching our children how to grapple with the challenges of this world (cont pg 7)

Defending the Faith - Linking Culture with Truth

A New Look at an Old Story

I know I first heard the account in Mark 2:1-12 in children's Sunday School many years ago. I'm sure you know it as well. Jesus is teaching in a house in the town of Capernaum. Four guys come to the house because they want Jesus to heal their paralytic friend, but they can't get into see Him because of the large crowd blocking the way. So the men, literally, tear the roof off of the building and lower their friend on his stretcher to Jesus, who healed the man of his paralysis.

There is more in this account that just a story of healing, though. Jesus Christ uses this incident to reveal to the gathered crowd, and to us, His identity. Mark 2:1-12 gives us four pieces of evidence to show that Jesus is God.

First, Jesus healed the man (v. 12). This is the last and most obvious thing that happened in the account, but it also informs us of something much greater. By healing the paralytic, Jesus was showing that He was in control over physical laws governing life and also had the ability to forgive sins.

The second piece of evidence is that Jesus forgave the man's sin (v. 5).

This is what Jesus did first, even before healing the paralytic. Jesus knew that there was a deeper problem in the man's life, that the paralysis was the outward sign of an inward problem. That had to be dealt with first, even before Jesus took care of the man's physical ailment.

Third, Jesus knew what was in the hearts of people. Jesus saw the faith of the four friends (v. 5). Perhaps they had seen or heard of Jesus's healing ministry and they were willing to put their faith into action by coming to Jesus with their friend and dismantling the roof of someone else's home in their determination. Jesus saw the desire of the paralytic, both to be forgiven and to be healed. Jesus also knew what the scribes were "thinking to themselves" (v. 6). In their hearts, the scribes accused Jesus of blasphemy. They knew that someone who forgave sins was saying openly that he was taking God's prerogative and acting as though he had the authority of God. Finally, Jesus described Himself as the "Son of Man" (v. 10). This was Jesus' favorite title for Himself and the term is used eighty-eight times in the New Testament to describe Jesus. It goes back to Daniel 7:13-14 and Daniel's vision of an eternal figure that will, in the words of Christian philosopher and apologist Dr. William Lane Craig, "come at the end of the world to judge mankind and rule forever."

Each of these pieces of evidence is something that only God could do. At the end of the account, everyone is amazed, saying, "We have never seen anything like this" (v. 12). That is true. They were seeing God in human flesh.

Mark 2:1-12

2 And Jesus having returned to Capernaum, after some days it was rumored about that He was in the house [probably Peter's]. 2And so many people gathered together there that there was no longer room [for them], not even around the door; and He was discussing the Word. 3 Then they came, bringing a paralytic to Him, who had been picked up and was being carried by four men. 4 And when they could not get him to a place in front of Jesus because of the throng, they dug through the roof above Him; and when they had scooped out an opening, they let down the [thickly padded] quilt or mat upon which the paralyzed man lay. 5 And when Jesus saw their faith [their confidence in God through Him], He said to the paralyzed man, Son, your sins are forgiven [you] and put away [that is, the penalty is remitted, the sense of guilt removed, and you are made upright and in right standing with God]. 6 Now some of the scribes were sitting there, holding a dialogue with themselves as they questioned in their hearts, 7 Why does this Man talk like this? He is blaspheming! Who can forgive sins remove guilt, remit the penalty, and bestow righteousness instead] except God alone? 8 And at once Jesus, becoming fully aware in His spirit that they thus debated within themselves, said to them, Why do you argue (debate, reason) about all this in your hearts? 9 Which is easier: to say to the paralyzed man, Your sins are forgiven and put away, or to say, Rise, take up your sleeping pad or mat, and start walking about [and keep on walking]? 10 But that you may know positively and beyond a doubt that the Son of Man has right and authority and power on earth to forgive sins—He said to the paralyzed man, 11 I say to you, arise, pick up and carry your sleeping pad or mat, and be going on home. 12 And he arose at once and picked up the sleeping pad or mat and went out before them all, so that they were all amazed and recognized and praised and thanked God, saying, We have never seen anything like this before! Amplified Bible

Start collecting things a homeless person might need, things that we take for granted, such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, pull-tab tinned fruit or vegetables with a plastic spoon and fork, peanut butter crackers...the list goes on. (See below a list of other handy products.) Put some of these items in a gallon-sized plastic bag and carry them around in your car with you. Then pass them out to the homeless as you encounter them. Make sure you include a small Bible or simple tract outlining the love of Jesus, who was Himself

homeless while on earth!

Heart of Hope

"My daughter told me she was pregnant last night. I don't know what to do." Unlike this mom, Heart of Hope – A Sanctuary for Women is prepared for this confession. As our community's only Maternity Home, Heart of Hope is a safe place for young women to live so they can face the chal-



lenges ahead in a loving, safe and supportive environment.



Heart of Hope is faith-based and licensed by the state with a capacity to care for 8 young women. Since opening in December 2010, it has been a home away from home for 19 pregnant ladies. No young woman is turned away due to lack of funds. Heart of Hope is financially supported by church, individual and business donations, along with its annual fundraisers.

Heart of hope gives young women, ages 11-23, a sanctuary away from the pressures of their peers as they decide what will be best for themselves and their babies. Should it be parenting, adoption, or marriage? Along with continuing their education, the young women also receive professional counseling and private health care. Heart of Hope offers important classes to prepare the young women for parenthood and independent living including classes on childbirth, prenatal and nutrition, classes on boundaries, and other life skills such as budgeting, meal planning, cooking and job/employment skills.



Heart of hope models traditional family living with houseparents residing in the home with the young women. Since many young women will come with problems associated with men, the house parent husband's role is especially important during this time, as he can become a positive father figure and impart identity and purpose into their lives.

- Heart of Hope is located just outside Shreveport, Louisiana in the peaceful rural area of Grawood Community in the town of Keithville.
- We are able to house up to eight girls from the ages of 11 to 23.



- HOH models Christian living in its purest form -- out loud and in front for all to see.
- Families are encouraged to help cover the cost according to their ability to pay, but no one is turned away because of their inability to pay.

(cont. from page 3) but in reality, it often works the other way around. Children teach us how to exalt in monotony—how to find God in the here and now. G.K. Chesterton observed, "It is possible that God says every morning, 'Do it again' to the

sun. And every evening 'Do it again' to the moon. It may not be automatic necessity that makes all daisies alike. It may be that God makes every daisy separately, but has never gotten tired of making them. It may be that He has the eternal appetite of infancy. For we have sinned and grown old, and our Father is younger than we."

At times, I'm pierced by love too immense to suffer the confines of my small life, and that's hard. But the answer, for me, is Christ—who gave His life for mine and, in so doing, gives me the capacity to receive all that this splendid world can offer. I hold it in my arms each night when I put my children to bed.

So here's the trade-off: I get to give up my claim to myself. And receive love that defies logic. Yes, I'm tired and I don't have much time for myself anymore. My car is a mess and I'm late a lot. The few fashionable outfits I own have catsup stains on them. But who wants Paris without someone to share it with? I've found the Southern Cross is as miraculous to my little boys as it was to me when I first saw those stars. I'm rediscovering life with them. And this time around, it's purer. I'm nearly 40 and I build snowmen on my lawn before breakfast, jump up and down on my bed, play with my spaghetti, eat more frosting than cookies, and skip school with my boys to go to matinees. I play stare-eyes and Monopoly® and "oh-my-goodness, where are my boys?" I lick snow off the hood of my car (stay with me on this—we only get the stuff once a year in Georgia, and it's special), bury myself in the leaf pile, and climb trees. I spend my money on Legos® and toy soldiers and rubber duckies. I read Shell Silverstein and Jack London and Dr. Seuss. I laugh till I cry, and cry till I laugh.

I never really wanted kids. A perception exists among many young women (like me) that motherhood is a vocation reserved for certain types of people. The words organized, nurturing, crafty, and patient come to mind. But the mystery of parenthood is far deeper than our trifling categories. Disorganized, anxious women who get lost on their daily commute, drink way too much coffee, and don't eat vegetables make terrific moms. I know from experience. The unexpected transformation that takes place in a woman when she carries a child in her womb and gives birth is an act of both life and death. Something in us dies—a certain sureness and aloofness, confidence that comes from taking care of only ourselves. In its place real love is born—naked, weak, and true.

Last night, my oversized 5-year-old scolded, "Mom, don't call me your squeaky little biscuit!" I hate to see him grow up so fast. Maybe I'll have another one. . .

"Because it's been laying outside, you don't know where it's been, it's dirty and probably has germs" I replied.


At this point, my daughter looked at me with total admiration and asked, "Wow! How do you know all this stuff?"


