The “4/14 Window” Child Ministries and Mission Strategies

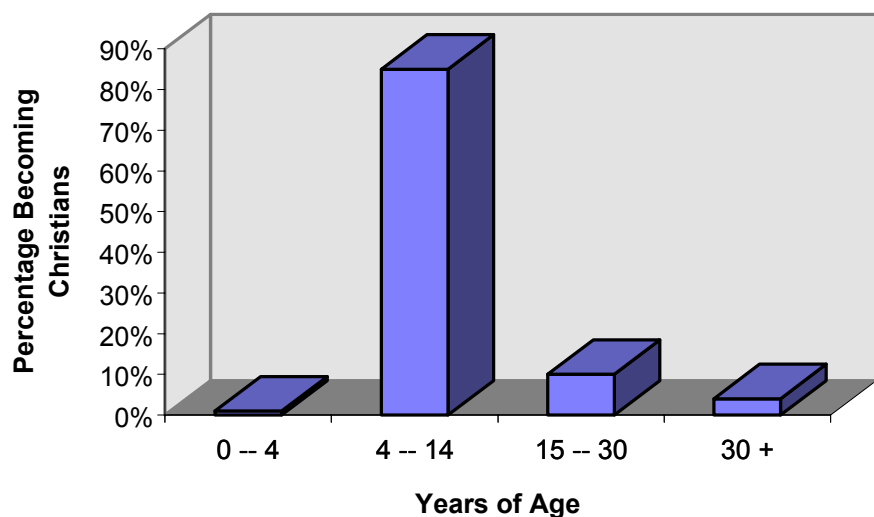
There are no more significant missiological concepts from the last half of the 20th century than the new understandings about God’s concern for the peoples of the world, and the realization that most of those who have not heard the Gospel live in the regions designated as the “10/40 Window.”

Yet there is another “window within the window” which may be just as significant as we think of new strategies for missions in the 21st Century. That window is what I call the “4/14 Window.”

The “4/14 Window”

Some years ago, Dr. Bryant Myers, Director of World Vision’s MARC Ministries, painted a sobering picture of the numbers and conditions of children and youth throughout the world today, and noted some of the implications that this huge and often suffering people group presents to mission strategists today. But the most significant portion of his presentation was the stunning graphic below, which shows that in the USA, nearly 85 percent of people who make a decision for Christ, do so between the ages of 4 and 14!

Ages at Which People Become Christians



George Barna, in his book, *Transforming Children into Spiritual Champions*, presents results of extensive research related to faith decisions in the US.

He reports that most 13 year-olds in the US, 93 percent, consider themselves to be Christian, though only about 34 percent of these really have an understanding of what it means to be a Christian. However, if people are going to become a Christian, they are far more likely to make that decision by the age of 13 than after that age. Barna states that:

...the probability of someone embracing Jesus as Saviour was 32 percent for those between the ages of 5 and 12; 4 percent for those in the 13-18 range; and 6 percent for people 19 or older. In other words, if people do not embrace Jesus Christ as their Savior before they reach their teenage years, the chance of their doing so at all is slim.

Barna urges us to “Consider the facts. People are much more likely to accept Christ as their Savior when they are young. Absorption of biblical information and principles typically peaks during the preteen years. . . . Habits related to the practice of one’s faith develop when one is young and change surprisingly little over time.”

“The implications are clear,” says Barna. “Anyone who wishes to have significant influence on the development of a person’s moral and spiritual

foundations had better exert that influence while the person is still open-minded and impressionable – in other words, while the person is still young.”

I’ve conducted my own surveys, and it has largely confirmed this important missiological fact. Generally about 60% of the people I ask say that they became Christians between the ages of 4 and 14. Evidence confirmed... children and young people are indeed “the world’s most fruitful field.”

Over one-third of the world’s population, nearly 2 billion people, are under the age of 18. Nearly half of the world’s population is under the age of 20. Surely these facts must catch the attention of the thinkers and planners for church ministries and missions for the 21st century.

People tend to be receptive when their lives are disrupted. The poor and exploited tend to be much more receptive to the Gospel. There is no people group today whose lives are more disrupted than those of children and youth.

Thousands of children are dying every day from malnutrition and preventable diseases. Those in the “4/14 window” remain the most affected and vulnerable. Statistics indicate that between 100 and 200 million children around the world call the streets their home.

UNICEF notes that “at one time, wars were fought between armies; but in the wars of the last decade far more children than soldiers have been affected. Over that period, approximately 2 million have died in wars, between 4 and 5 million physically disabled, more than 5 million forced into refugee camps, and more than 12 million left homeless.”

The needs and injustices cry out for attention. But the net result globally is a suffering, disrupted people group which is often hungry for the touch of the Gospel. Attention to this 4/14 window is imperative for any church serious about reaching truly receptive peoples.

Experience demonstrates that one of the most significant interventions for church growth is to assist the church in developing a child health, education, and spiritual nurture program. If child assistance programs are done right, if non-Christians are enrolled, and if parents included, those churches will grow. Guaranteed. And in the process, many of those families - both the children and the adults - will come to Christ.

What higher calling could the churches aspire to? What initiatives could Christians do which is more important and would possibly bear more fruit over the long run? If the churches don’t do it, who will? Surely the churches can be motivated and energized by a ministry so close to the heart of God.

Dangerous idea #6

Humanity has Value and Dignity

Some months ago I promised to review another chapter of Kenneth Richard Samples' book, *Christianity's Dangerous Ideas*. In chapter 6, Dr. Samples outlines many human qualities God bestowed on humans which cause us to be uniquely created in His image. Some of those attributes were reviewed in previous issues of The Bridge. The quality of bearing the image of God dignifies each human to an equal degree. Being created in God's image lays the foundation for the sacredness of human life. Dr. Samples writes, "All people - regardless of race, sex, class, age, standing, health, appearance, or other distinctions - deserve respect and dignified treatment as the crown of creation." He cites James 3:9 which says, "Praising God and cursing the people made in his image is morally inconsistent and sinful." He also quotes Reformed theologian, Anthony Hoekema, who explains, "To touch the image of God is to touch God Himself; to kill the image of God is to do violence to God himself."

The stage is now set to understand the differences of opinion between Christians and secular humanists when this belief is applied to the social issues of our day, abortion on demand and active euthanasia. Laying aside the quality of God's image that separates humans from the remainder of the animal world relegates treatment of the unborn and dying to changing social custom and public convenience. Individuals who spurn the image of God and the sanctity of human life bearing His image, have ushered in a new culture of death. Once this basic quality of human distinction has been swept away, there remains no foundational basis for equating each human life as having equal value. Without this grounding, the worth of each person, or groups of people becomes a matter of convenience to be determined in the public square and the arena of politics. In the case of

abortion on demand and active euthanasia, these differences relate to life and death. Since the unborn and dying have less worth and value to society in current post-Christian culture or are burdensome, they don't deserve to live and may be terminated for convenience sake. It is no surprise that the attack on the image of God is being carried out at these extremes of life since humans are most vulnerable at these times.

Concerning abortion on demand, the Christian draws justification to oppose the current abortion laws directly from scripture. There are many passages as I site just one, Psalm 139:13-16, where we can conclude that the unborn are actual persons undergoing development toward their full potential. A seemingly endless stream of arguments between believers and abortion advocates is currently being aired with hot dialogue attending each discussion. One argument is, "Abortion is a decision between a woman and her doctor." Another is, "If you believe that abortion is wrong, then don't have one but don't force your beliefs on me." Can't the abortion issue be simplified? I believe it can. If we are not created in God's image, no argument is needed to justify abortion. We're just another creature on the surface of the earth free to do as we please. On the other hand, if we are created in the image of God, no argument provides sufficient justification.

Regarding euthanasia, we're not talking about passive euthanasia which refers to withholding or withdrawing life-sustaining treatment to the terminally ill such as respirators, artificial kidney machines or drugs that would only prolong a burdensome or painful dying process. In such cases the person dies from the natural disease process itself. This is not objectionable. Active euthanasia, on the other hand, requires deliberate action which terminates the life of a person independent of any underlying disease process or condition. This is objectionable. Scripture prohibits the taking of innocent human life. (Exod. 20:13; Deut. 5:17)

It is the belief that humans were created in the image of God that has motivated Christians to oppose slavery, poverty, genocide, infanticide, abortion on demand and active euthanasia. There is no reason to change our position now.

- **TOYS:** Small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmon-

- **HYGIENE ITEMS:** Toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

Churches can stand firm against new Boy Scouts membership policy

memo explains legal ramifications

IRVING, Texas — Alliance Defending Freedom is providing guidance to churches on the legal ramifications of the Boy Scouts of America's change to its longstanding membership policy. In May, the BSA Executive Committee changed the policy so that it now allows Scouts to be of any "sexual orientation or preference." Many churches sponsor Boy Scout troops.

"Churches have an obligation to retain their values and teach biblically based morality," said Senior Counsel David Cortman. "They are not the ones who are abandoning the Boy Scouts. Rather, it is the Boy Scouts who have chosen to abandon the centuries-old moral and religious principles that formed a shared bond between BSA and religious groups."

The Alliance Defending Freedom memo explains that "under threat of litigation, a church that chooses to maintain ties with BSA could face forfeiting the ability to teach biblical principles of sexual morality to its Scouts and to require them to adhere to those principles." The memo also explains that "a compromise on this issue could have the undesirable side effect of weakening a church's First Amendment rights to freedom of expression and freedom of association."

"We have provided this information to churches that have been associated with BSA so that they can protect their freedom to freely preach the Gospel," added Senior Legal Counsel Erik Stanley, an Eagle Scout. "Churches cannot abandon their duty to be a witness to our nation's youth and must be able to continue to make decisions based on their religious principles."

Ministry with Single-Parent Families

In Page, Arizona there is a bridge spanning a grand expanse called the Glen Canyon Dam Bridge. This structure holds back water from Lake Powell and regulates its flow into the Colorado River as it rushes along the Grand Canyon floor. On a recent visit, I coaxed my three older kids to

walk with me over the bridge. While on the bridge, God gave me a vision for *Single Parent Family Ministry*.

On the south rim I saw hundreds of thousands of single parents with their children at different stages along their single parent family journey. On the north rim I saw the hope and healing from pain, trouble and tears that can only be found in Christ. A vast chasm separated the single parent families from Christ's hope and healing. The vision was for the church to become the bridge that connects the two.

I believe that we as leaders (both paid and volunteer) have a great opportunity to "be the bridge" and walk single parents and their children from despair to hope and from pain to healing. Living life as a single parent is a journey with markers along the way to chart the course. This article will describe five of those markers—pauses on the journey that allow single parents to measure their progress and take certain truths to heart. Leaders who can help single parents to implement these life-changing principles will be well on their way to becoming the bridge towards hope and healing. Jump in and BE THE BRIDGE!

Principle #1: Tell Kids the Truth

Most kids who live in single parent or blended families are hurting. They no longer feel like part of a family. They want their parents to get back together—to go back to the way things were in a happier time. They feel isolated, alone, without opportunities to talk out their fears and feelings. I believe they need to know why and how this all happened to them. If asked, parents should tell these children the truth about why they live in a single parent home. Answer the question, "Why did my mom (or dad) leave?" If death took a parent away, kids need to know how their parent died. They also need to know when so the date of death can be commemorated.

If it was a divorce, children need to know that it was not their fault. The main reason children think that the divorce was their fault is because nobody has told them the reasons for the divorce. If it is a separation, explain

what is happening and reassure

them that they will still be loved and cared for even though the marriage is in limbo. If their mother and father were never married, they should be told the circumstances surrounding the pregnancy. Leave no doubt in the child's mind that the circumstances of their birth had nothing to do with anything the child did.

Use the following tips to help single parents talk with their kids truthfully:

- Tell them the truth before they hear it from someone else! If you don't, you also risk having to deal with issues of trust and respect.
- Focus on the behavior, not on assassinating the character of the other parent. Attacks on character will have negative consequences and may ultimately harm your child.
- Let the kids lead the conversation. Kids who are quiet may need help in breaking through their blocked emotions. Encourage the children to ask questions—the hard questions. If their questions make you want to cry or get angry, set up a later time when you can control your emotions better—but keep the appointment.
- Sometimes what kids say isn't really what they want to ask. A kid who says "I hate you!" usually doesn't mean it! What he means is that he feels safe enough with you to express his emotions, even when he doesn't understand what is making him feel the way he does. Try to get him to tell you more.
- The best way to talk about the changes that have happened in the family (or are about to happen) is to have both parents sit down with the kids and tell the same story. If this won't work, give the former spouse opportunities to "come clean" with the kids before you do it for him or her. If you are the one to tell the kids about their mom or dad's behavior, keep your emotions in check (you need to find a safe adult to share those feelings with).
- Time and truth walk hand in hand. The kids will ask over and over about what happened. As they mature, you need to give more information on the way to full disclosure.

Principle #2: Encourage Visitation

If at all possible, kids need to have a relationship with both birth parents. Kids long to have a relationship with both parents—it's how God designed us! Don't sabotage that longing because of your own emotions. Kids place such a high value on relationship with both parents that if either parent tries to inhibit contact, watch out for a backlash!

Kids have the right to have a relationship with both parents. Visitation opportunities should be encouraged and should not be used as a weapon against a former spouse. Disagreements about issues such as lifestyles, movies, foods, bedtimes, discipline, live-in girlfriend/boyfriend might not necessarily be good enough reasons to stop the visits. Encourage single parents to find godly counsel to try to resolve these tough issues.

Perhaps of even higher priority is safety. Kids should never be put at risk. Providing for safe situations is the responsibility of both parents. Be careful to separate out situations that are truly a safety issue from those

things that are just outside of a parent's comfort zone. Encourage single parents to be realistic about situations that they can and can't control.

Principle #3: Learning to Let Go

Single parents who constantly worry and try to control everything that goes on when the kids are with their former spouse are wasting both physical and emotional energy. That energy would be better spent on investing into the lives of their children when they have them in their own house.

Most of the success of this principle depends on giving up control and allowing God to step in. Perhaps it is a lack of faith that keeps them in the 'control zone' where they feel a need to control everything. As church leaders, you may need to help them find the right answers to these questions: Does God love their children? Can He take care of them when they are 'over there?' (Remember, we are not talking about turning our eyes

Don't let anyone tell your single parents that all they need is a new spouse! Blending a family is hard work! Make it possible for single parents to stay single until their kids are out of the home. Supply the single parent's need for relationship in your ministry so they don't feel compelled to date or get re-married until the kids are grown. What single parents need more than another spouse is a supportive church that views them as whole. Instead of being pressured to remarry, single parent homes should be viewed as families and should be equipped to function as families. The kids need time and energy and love. God can be a husband and a father—God can complete the single parent family!

Churches should be called on to fulfill James 1:27 which says, "Pure and undefiled religion is to visit widows (single parents) and orphans (kids in single parent or blended families) in their distress."

One way of reinforcing the concept that single parent families are whole and valued is to place single parent families into the Family Ministry of the church. Make sure that the Family Pastor has a heart for non-traditional families first. Single parents are not "Single Adults with Kids." Single parent families are a family that just so happens to be un-married. Single parent families are not half a family. Single parents don't have kids growing up in a broken family. A single parent family is a whole family experiencing brokenness.

Living life as a single parent can be extremely difficult, but with the help of leaders in the church and believers in the church coming alongside, the burdens can become lighter. Becoming the bridge for single parents and their children—enabling them to find hope and healing in Christ—is one of the most rewarding acts today's church can perform. The need is huge but the benefits—both now and for the future—are enormous.

and ears away from someone or something that would bring harm.) We are talking about that age old prayer: *God, grant me the serenity to change the things that I can change, to accept the things that I cannot change and the wisdom to know the difference.*

Principle #4: Modeling Forgiveness

This is probably the most difficult principle to implement. It is also the one principle that when implemented, will produce the most life change.

Single parents should be encouraged to start by asking their kids for forgiveness! Parents forget that they might need to do that. "I'm sorry for the pain that I have caused you. I did not mean for this to happen, but I know that it hurts. Will you please forgive me?" These are empowering words to children in single parent homes created by divorce. This is not an opportunity to get into how much more responsible the former spouse is for their child's pain. The quality of their former spouse's relationship with their kids is his or her responsibility.

Next, kids need to see forgiveness modeled in the actions and attitudes expressed toward the former spouse. Kids need to know that even after all the fighting, conflict, tears and anger, forgiveness is still possible. Modeling forgiveness to their kids by forgiving the former spouse is a process that may take years, but it all starts with an act of the will. Choose to forgive. Release the bitterness. Whether or not the former spouse cares or responds isn't important—there is comfort and freedom in exercising forgiveness.

Principle #5: One is a Whole Number

Single parents and their families have value. God loves single parent families and in Him they are made whole. Embrace the full meaning of Psalms 68:5 ("I will be a husband to the widow and a father to the fatherless") that God has stepped into the gap and completed the single parent

God does not say, "If you have the time and if it isn't too inconvenient for you, I would like to suggest that you spend some time with children of divorce and single parents." God says to "defend the orphan and plead for the widow"! The words "defend" and "plead" are not merely suggestions; they are commands!

The biblical command to "defend the orphan and plead for the widow" is given in the same verse as "keeping oneself unstained by the world." They are both "undefiled religion in the sight of our God." This means that the pursuit of holiness and ministry to children of divorce and single parents should both be priorities for the church.

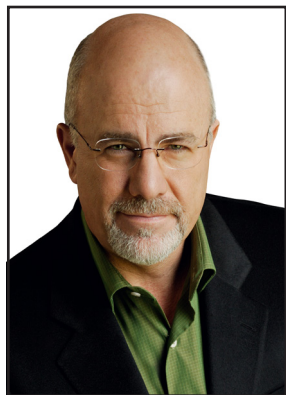
